### CONTEXT: ANDRA UNDERGROUND RADIOACTIVE WASTE REPOSITORY





Long-term behavior of nuclear waste canisters in geological repository depends on:

- Metallic materials
- Geochemical features of the surrounding (pH and redox potential)

1000-years behavior from link geochemical and corrosion models

### DPCM: DIFFUSION POISSON COUPLED MODEL AS CORROSION MODEL FOR PASSIVE IRON



DPCM: mechanistic model involving 40 parameters to solve the Poisson and Fick coupled equations in moving boundaries situation

### CALIPSO: DIFFUSION POISSON COUPLED MODEL EQUATIONS SOLVER [2]

- Numerical methods
- Based on a fully implicit resolution of coupling between:
  - > Fick
  - Poisson
  - Moving interfaces equations



- Steady or dynamic situation
- Finite volume scheme with a discretization of Sharfetter & Gummel for convective-diffusive flux

### THERMODYNAMIC EQUILIBRIUM: POTENTIAL PROFILE IN SOLUTION/MAGNETITE/METAL SYSTEM

- Potential homogeneity in all phases for electrochemical equilibrium
- Interfaces always assumed uncharged



### THERMODYNAMIC EQUILIBRIUM: ELECTRONIC EQUILIBRIUM OF SOLUTION/MAGNETITE/METAL SYSTEM → INNER INTERFACE

In DPCM, kinetic of the electronic exchange between iron and the oxide is:

$$J_e = m_e^1 c_e^1 - k_e^1 c_e^{metal}$$

 $c_e^1$  and  $c_e^{metal}$ : electron concentrations in the oxide at the inner interface and in metal, respectively.  $m_e^1$  and  $k_e^1$ : kinetic constants of Richardson

At the equilibrium  $J_e = 0$ 



# THERMODYNAMIC EQUILIBRIUM: ELECTRONIC EQUILIBRIUM OF SOLUTION/MAGNETITE/METAL SYSTEM $\rightarrow$ INNER INTERFACE

- Butler-Volmer type law
- Kinectic of the electronic exchange between the oxide and the solution is kinectic redox of H<sup>+</sup>/H<sub>2</sub> couple:

$$J_{e} = m_{e}^{0} a_{H_{2}}^{n_{e}^{H_{2}}} \exp(b_{e}^{0} \gamma \Phi_{0}) - k_{e}^{0} 10^{-n_{e}^{pH} pH} c_{e}^{0} \exp(-a_{e}^{0} \gamma \Phi_{0})$$
$$a_{H_{2}}^{n_{e}^{H_{2}}} \text{ and } b_{e}^{0} \text{: Butler-Volmer coefficients}$$

Same processing for Fe<sup>3+</sup>/Fe couple

$$J_e = m_r^0 a_{Fe^{2+}}^{sol} \exp(a_r^0 \gamma \Phi_0) - k_r^0 a_{Fe^{3+}}^{sol} c_e^0 \exp(-b_r^0 \gamma \Phi_0)$$
$$a_{Fe^{2+}}^{sol}, a_{Fe^{3+}}^{sol} \text{ and } b_r^0: \text{ Butler-Volmer coefficients}$$

• At the equilibrium  $J_e = 0$

Reduction of number of independent parameters since kinetic ratio are constant

## a conclusions

Strategy organized step by step without using multifitting processing

- Step 1: Thermodynamic approach
  - based on equilibrium states
  - allows to reduce the number of independent parameters

Step 2: Study of the Oxide Host Lattice dissolution reaction (outer interface)

- based on experimental data in literature
- allow to determine dissolution rate of magnetite
- major parameter linked to pH of depassivation

Step 3: Study of the Oxide Host Lattice growth reaction (inner interface)

- based on experimental data in literature and CALIPSO simulation
- allow to know potential and pH ranges of passive film existence
- estimation of parameter value of the oxide growth
- Next step to setup  $k_{Fe}^0$
- Setup based on no corrosion data or experiments
- Possibility to check parameters values in simulating corrosion experiments
