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# THE CALPHAD (CALculation of PHAse Diagrams) APPROACH APPLIED TO THE FLUORIDES COMPOUNDS

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## **CALPHAD METHOD**



### Principle

- Computational method for calculating multicomponent phase diagrams
  - Phase diagram = graphical representation of thermodynamic properties Combination of thermodynamics (Gibbs energies) and phase diagrams data
- Thermodynamic equilibrium at T, p, N<sub>i</sub> is calculated by minimizing the total Gibbs energy G of the system





### Modelling

Phases with a fixed composition (pure elements, stoechiometric compounds)

$$G_m^{\varphi} - b_i \underbrace{H_i^{SER}}_{a_0} = a_0 + a_1 T + \frac{a_2}{2} T ln(T) + \frac{a_3}{2} T^2 + \frac{a_4}{2} T^{-1} + \frac{a_5}{2} T^3 + \cdots T_1 < T < T_2$$

Enthalpy of the element *i* in its reference state (298.15 K, 1 bar, denoted SER)

$$H = G - T \left(\frac{\partial G_m}{\partial T}\right)_{p,N_i} \rightarrow H_m^{\varphi} - b_i H_i^{SER} = a_0 - \frac{a_2}{a_2}T - \frac{a_3}{a_3}T^2 + 2\frac{a_4}{a_4}T^{-1} - 2\frac{a_5}{a_5}T^3 \dots$$

$$S = -\left(\frac{\partial G_m}{\partial T}\right)_{p,N_i} \qquad \Rightarrow \qquad S_m^{\varphi} = -a_1 - a_2 - \frac{a_2}{a_2}ln(T) - 2\frac{a_3}{a_3}T + \frac{a_4}{a_4}T^{-2} - 3\frac{a_5}{a_5}T^2 \dots$$

$$C_p = -T \left( \frac{\partial^2 G_m}{\partial T^2} \right)_{p,N_i} \quad \Rightarrow \quad C_p = -\frac{a_2}{2} - 2\frac{a_3}{2}T - \frac{2a_4}{2}T^{-2} - \frac{6a_5}{2}T^2 \dots$$

 $a_i$  coefficients are the model parameters assessed when experimental data are available : C<sub>p</sub>=f(T), H<sub>T</sub>-H<sub>298.15K</sub>, S<sup>0</sup>(298.15K),  $\Delta$ H<sup>0</sup><sub>f</sub> ...

## Modelling

#### Gas phase

Usually described as an ideal mixture of species

$$G_m^{gas} = \sum_i y_i \left[ {}^{\circ}G_i^{gas} - \sum_j b_{ij} H_j^{SER} + RTln(y_i) \right] + RTln\left(\frac{p}{p_0}\right)$$

-  $y_i$  = constituent fractions

-  $b_{ij}$  = number of atoms *j* in species *i* 

-  $p_0$  = standard pressure (1 bar)

## Optimization

- In the Gibbs energy functions, the parameters are adjusted to fit the available experimental data using a least-squares method
  - When data are scattered or missing
    - New experimental works can be carried out
    - First-principles calculations support can be used



## **CALPHAD** method

#### **First-principles calculations**

#### Gas molecules

- **1**<sup>st</sup> step: Optimization of the molecule geometry ( $E_{cohesive}$ ) and calculation of the vibrational frequencies ( $v_i$ )
- 2<sup>nd</sup> step: Thermodynamic properties calculation enthalpy (H), entropy (S), Gibbs energy (G), and heat capacity at constant pressure (Cp) versus temperature

- $\sigma: \text{symmetry number}$
- $I_A$ ,  $I_B$  and  $I_C$ , moment of inertia about principal axis

## **Conclusions and perspectives**

#### Conclusions

- CALPHAD is a suitable computational method to accurately model the thermodynamic and phase diagram data for multicomponent systems (ex: TAF with 40 elements)
- BUT reliable experimental data (phase diagram and thermodynamic properties ) are absolutly necessary
- Lack of data on fluoride and oxyfluoride compounds ⇒ first-principles calculations
  - $\Rightarrow$  experimental program
- Databases are useful to interpret or predict results on complex chemical systems

#### Perspectives

- Thermodynamic databases can be coupled with kinetic databases to solve diffusion equations (1 D) (assessment of mobility parameters)
- Development of nano-CALPHAD to deal with thermodynamics and phase diagrams for nanoparticles
