# A combined hydro- and pyrometallurgical process for REE recovery from used permanent magnets

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## **REE recycling: closing the materials loop**

#### **Advantages of recycling**

Target the most critical rare earths > No issues with **radioactive elements** Lower environmental footprint

#### **Challenges of recycling** > Low recycling rates for REE (< 1%) ➤ Waste collection (such as WEEE) Individually separate REE

Rare earth elements (REE) = Critical raw materials for European economy **REE demand growing**, especially for **magnets** (Nd, Dy most critical)

Need to diversify supply sources especially for heavy, critical elements (Dy)

#### **Opportunities**

- > Expertise of European recycling actors > Leveraging on the **urban mine**
- > Economic and environmental **impact**

### **Our approach to process development**



**Recycling NdFeB permanent magnets** 

- Most important market, driving REE demand (NTE)
- High REE concentration (25% Nd, 5% Pr, 2-8% Dy)
- Immediate availability



## The RECAPE process





#### Selection and evaluation of the extractant system

- Screening of **several extracting molecules**
- Selection of **diglycolamide (DGA)** extractants for **selective Dy extraction** versus Fe, B, Ni, Co and light REE



Solvent formulation: 0,2M TODGA + 5% octanol / TPH



#### **Tests on synthetic and genuine** magnet solutions in nitric acid

**Quantitative extraction** of Dy (D>100)

- **Efficient separations of REs** / transition metals (Fe, Co, Ni...) and RE/RE in a large range of acidity (0.4 to 5M)
- **No 3<sup>rd</sup> phase** formation in processes conditions

**Quantitative stripping of REE** at low acidity (pH 3) and high temperature (45-50°C)





#### **Process modelling**

Elaboration of a **phenomenological model** from experimental batch data **Representation of distribution equilibriums** HNO<sub>3</sub>-Oct, HNO<sub>3</sub>-TODGA, Ln-NO<sub>3</sub>-TODGA  $(HNO_3)(octanol)_2$  $\{TR(NO_3)_3, TODGA_n\}$  $(HNO_3)_m$ (TODGA) with m = 1 to 3  $\gamma_{TR(NO_3)_3} \cdot [TR(NO_3)_3] \cdot [\overline{TODGA}]^n$ - M(NO<sub>3</sub>)<sub>3</sub>(TODGA)<sub>n</sub> with n = 3-4 for Dy, Nd, Pr, Fe



**Activity coefficients** taken into account in aqueous phase **Good agreement** between extraction experiments and calculated

## **Development of the separation process flowsheet and pilot demonstration**

Calculation of flow sheets in 1 or 2 cycles to recover Dy and Nd+Pr with theoretical purities > 99.5% in a limited number of stages





Very good hydrodynamic behavior UV-vis on-line analysis (for Nd) and ICP-AES measurements for Dy, Pr, Nd, Fe Production of gram-scale Dy at 4.2 g/L

- values for both synthetic and real solutions
- Implementation of the model in the CEA PAREX simulation code and calculation of flow-sheets

Effective and compact process in two steps for Dy (step 1) and Nd+Pr (step 2) separation from **REE** solutions



Quantitative recovery of Dy with very high purity Dy recovery > 99% with purity > 99.9%

## Pyrometallurgical process for metal elaboration

Shiny metallic deposits

Faradic efficiency  $\approx 80\%$ 

Pyrometallurgical conversion of the separated REE into high purity RE metals Use of transient electroanalytical techniques (voltammetry reversal) chronopotentiometry, chronoamperometry...) to optimize the conditions Metal deposition tests to evaluate the process efficiency Glovebox setup

## Conclusions

- Development of a full RE separation process from used permanent magnets
  - **Collaboration** between **CEA/DRT** (magnet fabrication, front-end recycling process) and **CEA/DEN** (SX separation, RE conversion) in the frame of the **NTE programme**
- Demonstration of the scientific feasibility of Dy recovery by SX without preliminary separation of Fe, B and the coating elements by precipitation
- Production of pure Dy from real used magnets during the pilot tests
  - Experiments in progress on Dy and Nd-Pr conversion to oxides (oxalic precipitation) and to metals (electrolysis in molten salts)
  - Analysis on RE oxides and Dy metal to check the purity of the final products
- Optimization of the model and the process flow-sheet
- **Scale-up** of the process and **techno-economic study** are in progress to evaluate the cost of such process at an industrial scale
