- •How small are allowable ELMs in ITER?
 - related to ELM burn through of detached plasmas

- 1. Simulations of ELMs in ITER with the non-linear MHD code JOREK
 - using reduced MHD model with fluid neutrals
- 2. Extension of the divertor model in JOREK
 - implementing kinetic neutrals and impurities



Non-linear MHD code JOREK (www.jorek.eu)

- JOREK code solves the (extended) MHD equations in 3D general tokamak geometry
 - -Closed and open field lines, plasma wall interaction, conducting structures
 - -Main applications: ELMs and disruptions
- developed with the EU fusion program
 - -14 Fusion Labs + Universities, ~25 persons
 - -GIT repository, wiki, decentralised development

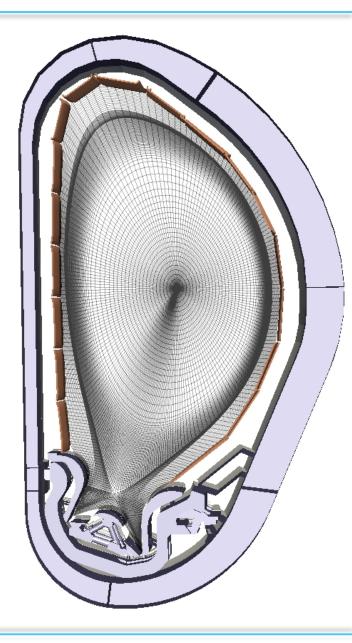
Characteristics

- -Cubic (Bezier) Finite element representation in the poloidal plane
 - Extension of cubic Hermite elements
- -Fourier series in the toroidal direction
- -Fully implicit time evolution
- -MPI/OpenMP parallelisation



ELM Simulations in ITER

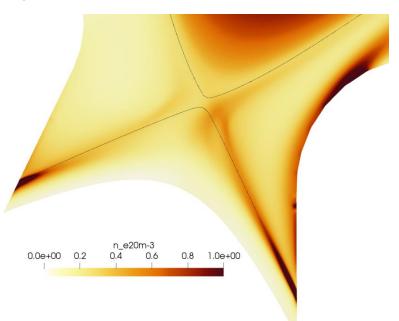
- Grid aligned on equilibrium flux surface, extending to realistic ITER wall (2D)
- MHD + Neutral fluid model
 - diffusive neutral model
 - Sheath boundary conditions
 - Mach one
 - Sheath transmission factor
 - Reflection of ions into neutrals

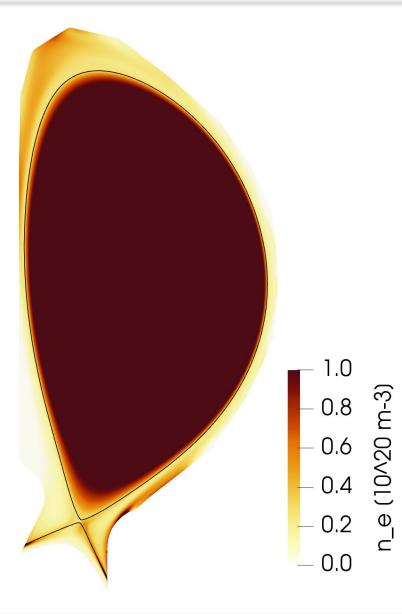




Initial Conditions ITER scenario

- Initial quasi-stationary state with high recycling ITER divertor
 - -15MA/5.3T Q=10 scenario (IMAS #131025)
 - $-W_{thermal} = 410 \text{ MJ}$
 - heating power 110 MW

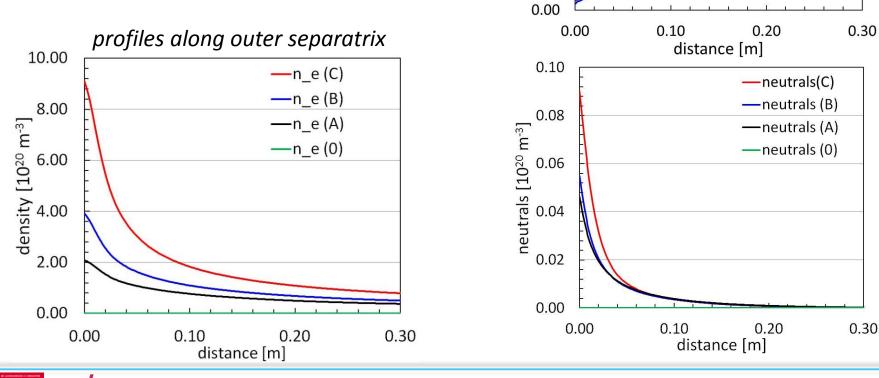






Initial Conditions: Divertor

- High recycling ITER divertor
 - neutral gas injection
 - Neon background impurity (5x10⁻³)
 - $-T_{div} \sim 6eV$, $Q_{max} \sim 6 MW/m^2$

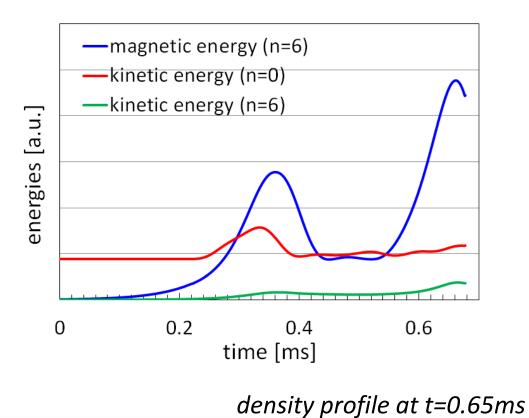

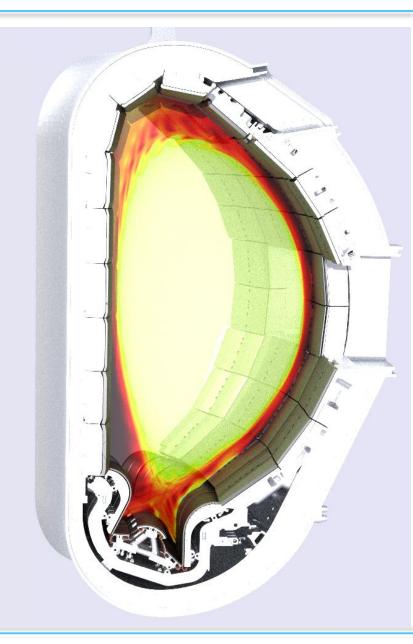

Small ELM

- n=6 (single harmonic)
- **ΔW ~ 1MJ**
- Peak dW/dt ~ 2GW (at 0.45 ms)

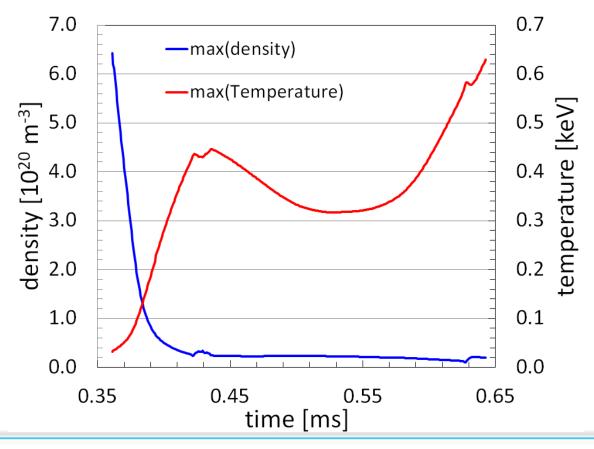






ELM "Burn through"

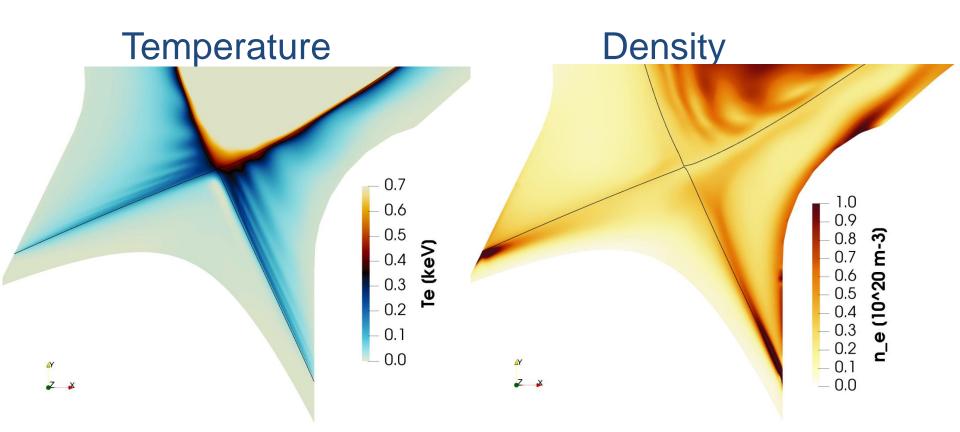
- The high density at the divertor is quickly (within 100 μs) removed by the ELM
 - together with fast temperature rise
 - at this time very little thermal energy has been lost : $\Delta W \sim 0.12 \text{ MJ}$



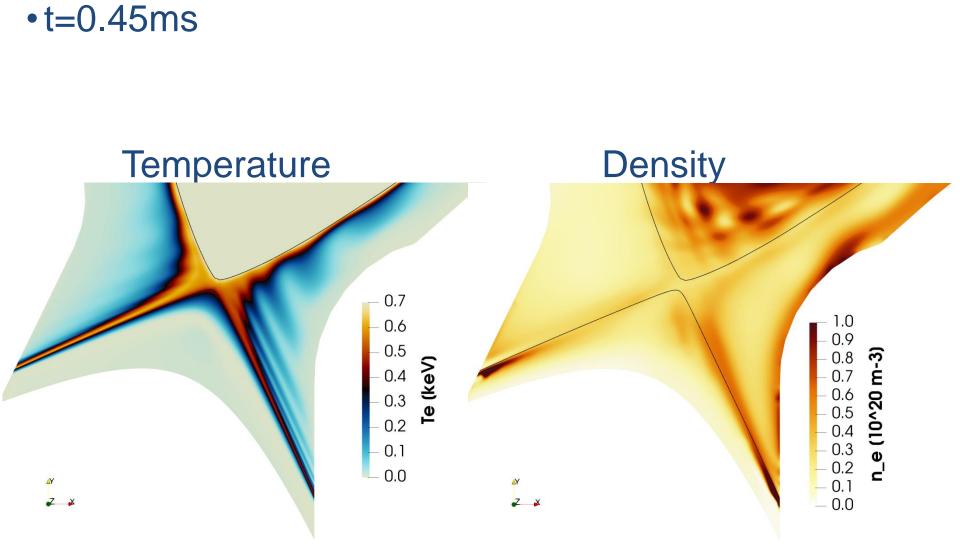

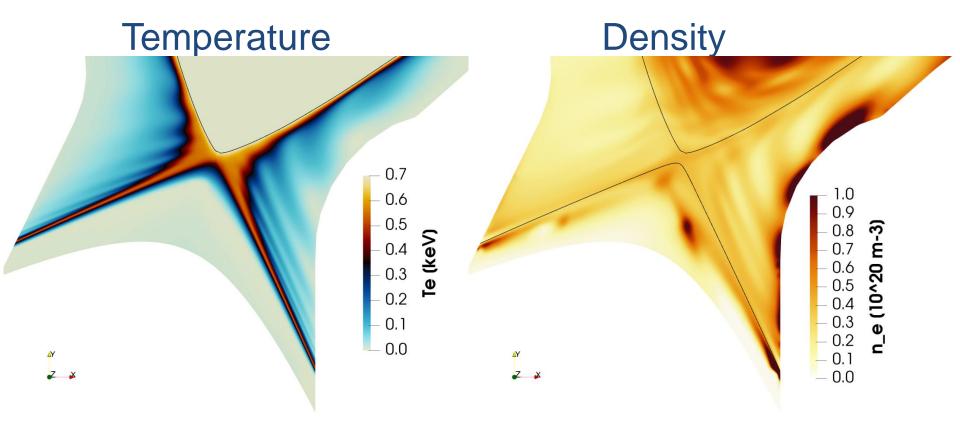

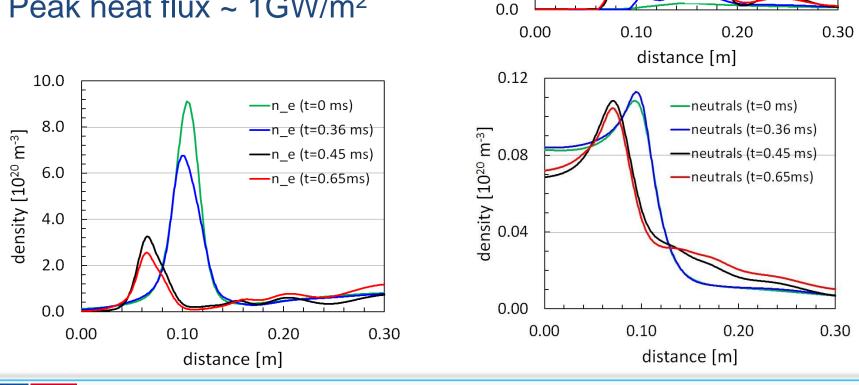
 a narrow channel of low density, high temperature at the main strike point





Outer Divertor Profiles

- One narrow peak in power deposition profile
 - no broadening
- High density and neutrals displaced below separatrix
- Peak heat flux ~ 1GW/m²

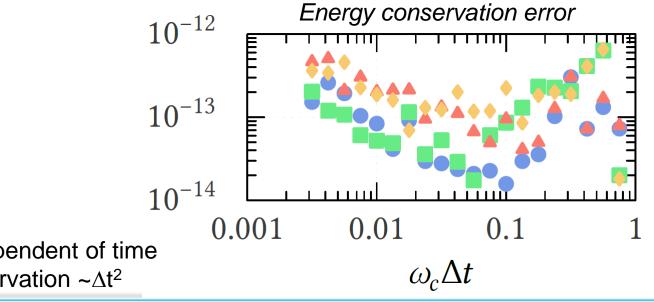

Particles in JOREK

- Particles are followed in the time evolving magnetic and electric field of the MHD fluid
 - full orbit using well-known Boris method (with correction toroidal geometry)
 - particles are followed in real space (R,Z, ϕ) and finite element space (s,t, ϕ)
 - charge states are evolving in time (ionisation, recombination, CX)
 - Particle-background collisions with binary collision model
 - sputtering model for impurity and neutral sources



Energy conservation independent of time step Δt , momentum conservation ~ Δt^2



Kinetic Neutrals

Coupling of JOREK MHD fluid and particles

-Particle contributions become sources in MHD equations

Conservative form:

$$\begin{aligned} \frac{\partial \rho}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot \left(\rho \vec{v}\right) &= S_{\rho} \\ \frac{\partial \left(\rho \vec{v}\right)}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot \left(\rho \vec{v} \vec{v}\right) + \nabla \cdot \overline{P} - \vec{J} \times \vec{B} = \vec{S}_{V} \\ \frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left(\frac{1}{2}\rho v^{2} + \frac{3}{2}\rho T\right) + \nabla \cdot \left(\frac{1}{2}\rho v^{2} \vec{v} + \frac{3}{2}\rho T \vec{v} + \vec{v} \cdot \overline{P}\right) &= S_{E} \end{aligned}$$

JOREK form

$$\begin{split} &\frac{\partial\rho}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot \left(\rho \vec{v}\right) = S_{\rho} \\ &\rho \frac{\partial \vec{v}}{\partial t} + \rho \left(\nabla \cdot \vec{v}\right) \vec{v} + \nabla \cdot \overline{P} = \vec{S}_{v} - \vec{v}S_{\rho} \\ &\frac{\partial \left(\frac{3}{2}\rho T\right)}{\partial t} + \vec{v} \cdot \nabla \left(\frac{3}{2}\rho T\right) + \frac{5}{2}\rho T \left(\nabla \cdot \vec{v}\right) = S_{E} - vS_{v} + \frac{1}{2}v^{2}S_{\rho} \end{split}$$



Sources, Moments

- The sources are given by: $S_{\rho}(\vec{x}) = \int mf(\vec{x}, \vec{v}) d\vec{v}$ $S_{\nu}(\vec{x}) = \int m\vec{v}f(\vec{x}, \vec{v}) d\vec{v}$ $S_{E}(\vec{x}) = \int \frac{1}{2}mv^{2}f(\vec{x}, \vec{v}) d\vec{v}$
- Express sources in JOREK finite element representation to obtain a continuous function from a list of discrete particles

$$\tilde{S}_{\rho}\left(\vec{x}\right) = \sum_{ijk} p_{\rho,ijk} H_{ij}\left(s,t\right) H_{\varphi,k}\left(\varphi\right)$$

Projection using weak form (system of equations to be solved)

$$\int v^{*}(\vec{x}) \tilde{S}_{\rho}(\vec{x}) d\vec{x} = \int v^{*} S_{\rho}(\vec{x}) d\vec{x}$$

$$\int v^{*}(s,t) \sum_{ijk} p_{\rho,ijk} H_{ij}(s,t) H_{\varphi,k}(\varphi) d\vec{x} = \int v^{*} mf(\vec{x},\vec{v}) d\vec{v} d\vec{x}$$

$$\int H(s,t) \sum_{ijk} p_{\rho,ijk} H_{ij}(s,t) H_{\varphi,k}(\varphi) d\vec{x} = \sum_{n} H(s,t) mw_{n} \delta(\vec{x} - \vec{x}_{n})$$



Moments: smoothing

- Some smoothing is required –depending on number of particles
- Modified projection equation:

$$\int v^* (\vec{x}) (1 - \lambda \nabla^2 - \varsigma \nabla^4) \tilde{S}_{\rho} (\vec{x}) d\vec{x} = \int v^* S_{\rho} (\vec{x}) d\vec{x}$$
$$\int (v^* \tilde{S}_{\rho} + \lambda \nabla v \cdot \nabla \tilde{S}_{\rho} + \varsigma \nabla^2 v^* \nabla^2 \tilde{S}_{\rho}) d\vec{x} = \int v^* S_{\rho} (\vec{x}) d\vec{x}$$

- LHS matrix is calculated and factorised once (using MUMPS)
- RHS is collected at every particle step
 - Important for conservation properties
- Projection (i.e. MUMPS solve) at every JOREK fluid time step



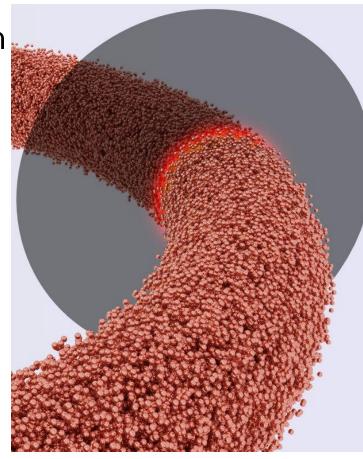
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Kinetic Neutrals

- 2-way coupling of JOREK MHD fluid and particle s –Kinetic neutrals have been implemented and verified
 - Ionisation, charge exchange, radiation
 Fluid ions arriving at the divertor/wall are reflected as neutral particles

-Test case:

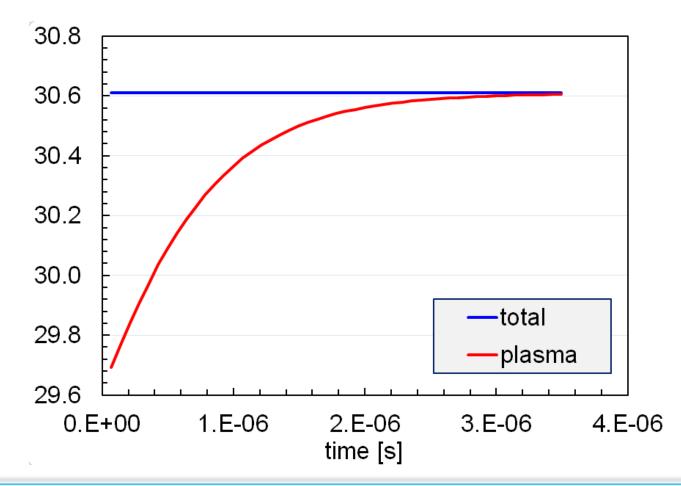
- Initial particle beam with parallel velocity
 - 100000 neutral particles (10²⁰)
 - Ionising within 3.5 μs
 - Particle time step 10⁻⁹ s, jorek step 6.87x10⁻⁸s





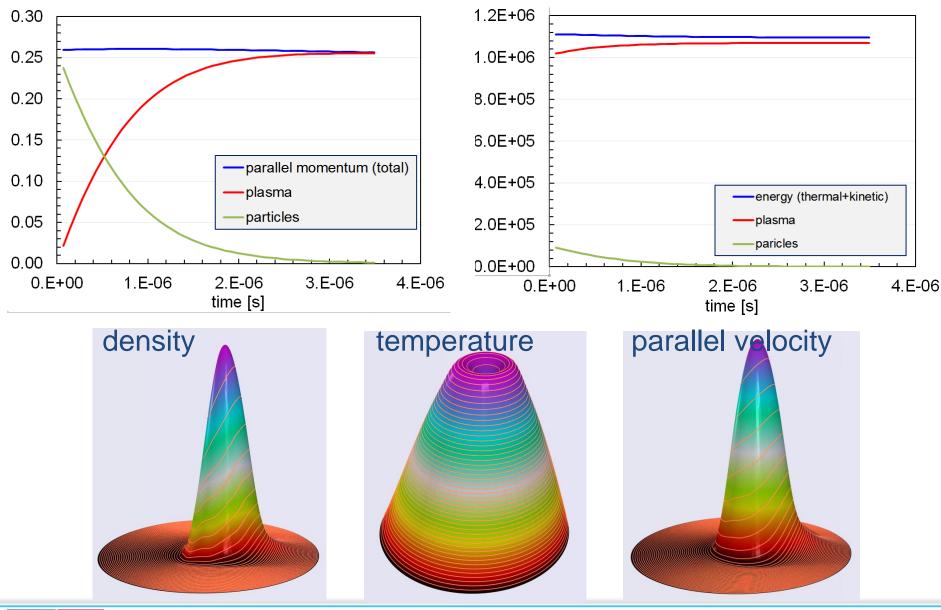
Particle Conservation

- Good particle conservation: error ~2x10⁻⁴
- Good agreement with fluid neutral model





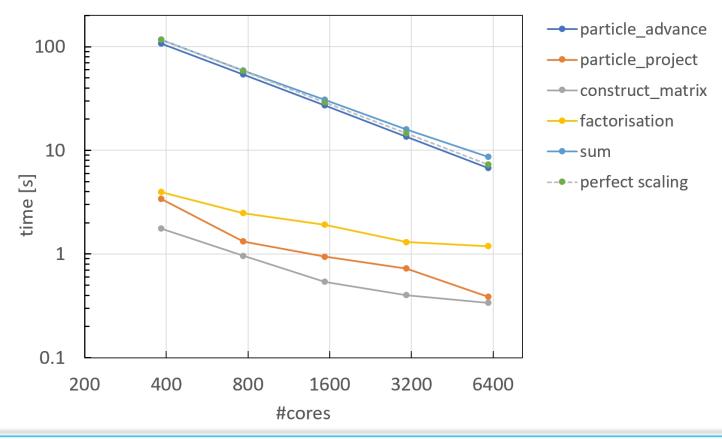
Momentum, Energy conservation





Parallelisation Scaling

- Good parallel scaling as long as particles dominate total time
 - 4x10⁷ particles, 1600 elements, 8 toroidal harmonics
 - Marconi, Skylake (1 mpi, 48 threads per node)
 - efficiency 84% at 6000 cores



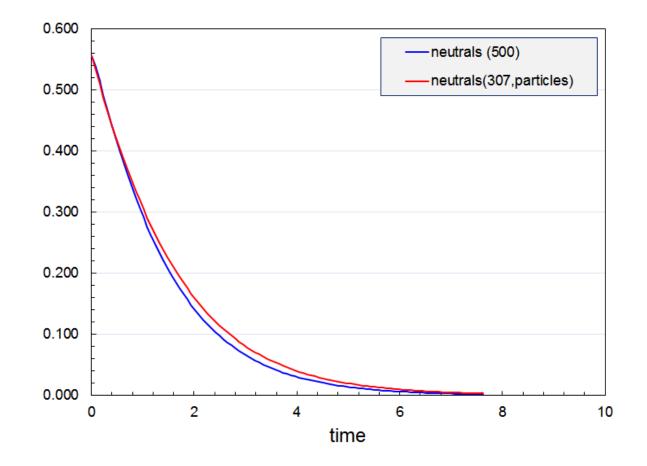


Comparison model 500-307

• Start with central population of neutrals:

-this is with an updated model for the ionisation rate in model500

-100.000 neutrals, total number 0.555555x10²⁰





Impurities in JOREK

- Impurities implemented as kinetic particles
 - ionisation, recombination, radiation
 - following all charge states, multiple species
 - binary collision model
 - collisions with back ground plasma

Sputtering source

- sputtering due to plasma fluid and kinetic impurities
- using Eckstein sputtering yields

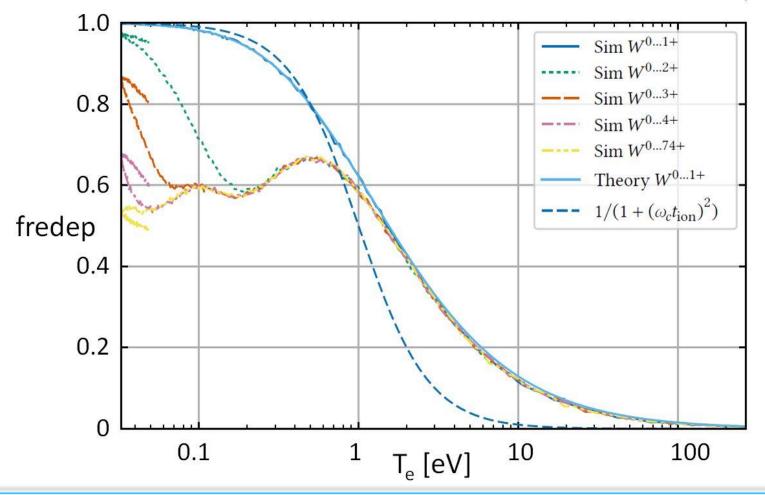
• Applications:

- Tungsten source with and without ELMs, prompt redeposition
- Tungsten transport due to ELMs



Tungsten Prompt Redeposition

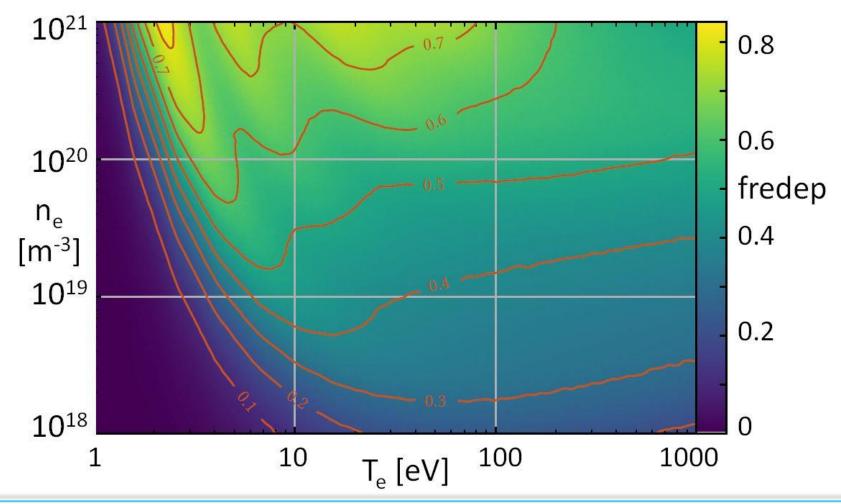
 Multiple ionisations have a strong influence on prompt redeposition fraction





Tungsten Prompt Redeposition

• Density and temperature dependence – including multiple ionisations (0-5)





Next Step: Applications

- Benchmarking
- Detachment, ELM burn-through
- Divertor solutions in 3D magnetic geometry (RMP)
- Impurity transport in ELM controlled regimes
 - RMP, QH mode
- Fast particles
- Massive Gas Injection , Shattered Pellet Injection
- Runaway electrons
