- Motivation:
 - Monte Carlo (MC) simulation codes: widely used to assess the response of detectors
 - Radioactive decay (RD) play an important role for many experiments
 - ✓ particle and nuclear physics, medical physics, ionizing radiation metrology...
 - \checkmark comprehensive and accurate knowledge of the decay schemes data is crucial
 - In ionizing radiation metrology: Penelope and Geant4 are common used
 - PENNUC (Fortran): RD routine using DDEP database is available in Penelope (2017)
 ✓ developed at CIEMAT, LNHB García-Toraño et al. Nucl. Instrum. Meth. B396 (2017)
 - Geant4: Radioactive Decay Module is available, based on popular ENSDF data library
 - ✓ original implémentation: Lei & Truscott, Tech. Rep. Qinetiq (2002), Geant4.9.4-p04 version
 - ✓ functional per-decay approach with a few inconsistencies and missing features
 - *e.g.*, low intensity emissions not taken into account for certain radionuclides,
 missing in β-decay (sample continuous decay emission), or deexcitation of the daughter atom...

• **Objective of this work:**

 \rightarrow Develop of a new C++ module (*Nuclide*++) for precise simulation of radionuclide sources

✓ based on DDEP recommended data – Kellett and Bersillon, EPJ Web Conf. 146 (2017)





• The new *Nuclide*++ radioactive decay module:

→ Able to generate decay schemes of radionuclides using DDEP recommended data

Requirements

• Decay an unstable nucleus

→ sample discrete decay (α , γ) and continuous decay (β^- , β^+) emissions

- Deexcite daughter nucleus
 - → sample gamma, X-rays and conversion electrons resulting from atomic deexcitation

→ sample fluorescence and Auger electrons due to shell vacancies

- Simplify the physical process of the radioactive decay and just generate particles associated to the spontaneous emission of ionizing radiation
- Improve and detail where necessary
- Handle large number of decays
- Handle decay chains efficiently
- Handle single or multiple radionuclides sources
- Include time dependence of detectors (to account for the delay of metastable state)
- Designed to use transparently in Geant4-based simulation applications







BRIEF INTRODUCTION TO GEANT4

Key Geant4 functionalities

- General purpose MC simulation tool for the transport of particles through matter
 - ✓ thanks to the polymorphism mechanism of C++, the users can easily plug-in their extensions without interfering with the other part of Geant4
 - minimal knowledge of the Geant4 structure and base classes
 - ✓ basic knowledge in C++ programming





- The database used consists of the following:
 - (1) DDEP database exported in specific format
 - Contains evaluated and validated atomic and nuclear data published by DDEP (~220 radionuclides)
 - ✓ possible transitions, branching ratios, type/energy of emitted particles → exported in ASCII file

• (2) Atom relaxation database: two ASCII files

- pdatconf.p14: atomic ground-state configurations, ionization energies, shell details
 - → prepared using radiative/non-radiative transition probabilities for sub-shells of elements from LLNL EADL
- **pdrelax.p11**: table of transitions, transition probabilities and energies of X-rays/electrons for ionised atoms with a single vacancy in K shell or in an L, M or N subshell
 - → from Penelope database
- \checkmark atomic rearrangement sampling on the basis of detailed KL₁L₂L₃, M, N, model
 - Grau Malonda et al., Comput. Phys. Com. 123 (1999) Kossert and Grau Carles, Appl. Radiat. Isot. 64 (2006)

• (3) BetaShape database

 \checkmark β spectra generated with **BetaShape** program – *Mougeot*, Phys. Rev. C91; Phys. Rev. C92 (2015)

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Flowchart describing the different steps of decays simulation **Identify selected radionuclide** name of the radionuclide of interest decay-extension factor (0: follow instable nucleus, 1: follow instable daughters) resolution time (characteristic of the detector) Read and store data from databases identify decay modes and normalize branching ratios and transition probabilities Sample nuclear decay pathways random selection through branching ratio and transition probability loops delayed transitions particles: particles selected considering the time evolution of radiation exp. distribution using expected lifetimes of excited levels $p(t) = \tau^{-1} exp(-t\tau^{-1})$ Generate a list of particles (type, energy...) in a decay event Pass to tracking in *PrimaryGeneratorAction::GeneratePrimaries(G4Event* event)* Or fill the decay scheme cascade output file

- The code implementations verified for consistency with DDEP data
 - Comparison with PENNUC developed at CIEMAT for Penelope code
 - ✓ well validated and considered in the radionuclide metrology community as a reference
 - → comparison against it provides a valuable evaluation
 - Comparison with existing Geant4-RDM
- Several radionuclide decays tested
 - γ -emitting radionuclides: ¹⁵²Eu, ¹³³Ba, ⁶⁰Co, ¹³⁴Cs, ¹³⁷Cs, ¹¹³Sn, ^{166m}Ho
 - EC radionuclides: ⁵⁵Fe, ⁵⁴Mn, ¹²⁵I
 - β -emitting radionuclides: ¹¹C, ¹⁸F, ⁴⁴Sc, ⁶³Ni, ³²P, ⁹⁰Y





¹³³Ba: decays by EC mainly to two ¹³³Cs excited levels of 437 keV (~85.4%) and 384 keV (~14.5%), and with minor branches (<1%) to 161 keV and 81 keV exited levels and to the ground state

¹⁵²Eu: decays (72.1%) by EC and about 0.027% by emission of positron to ¹⁵²Sm and by beta minus emission (27.9%) to ¹⁵²Gd

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CONCLUSION AND COMMENT

- *NUCLIDE*++: developed to improve the simulation of radioactive sources, offer an alternative to the existing RDM in Geant4
 - ✓ Takes advantage of DDEP recommended data for metrological applications
 - \checkmark Takes advantage of BetaShape program, for improving the nuclear data related to β emission properties
 - ✓ Good agreement with the Fortran PENNUC subroutine (electron/photons)
 - **✓** Comparing to Geant4-RDM, α and γ -emission intensities are consistent
 - Significant consistency improvements are obtained especially for β-emitting radionuclides, and atomic rearrangement induced by EC or IC
 - ✓ Ready to use in Geant4-based simulation applications
 - \checkmark The outcome cascade file can be used independently for other applications
 - → Discrete emitted spectrum can be use to test algorithms in nuclear instrumentation
 - ✓ Advanced test must be performed for the simulation of mixed sources (efficient generation of a large number of decays, time and memory consuming...)
 - Propagation of uncertainties associated to the decay scheme data
- In the future, the module will be proposed on the LNHB website
