## **Context of the study**

#### Management of low and intermediate level nuclear waste in France

- In France, the National Radioactive Waste Management Agency **ANDRA** requests a radiological characterization of nuclear waste and specifies acceptance criteria for packages that waste producers have to respect.
- <sup>36</sup>Cl is one radionuclide of interest for decommissioning and disposal of nuclear waste
  - <sup>36</sup>Cl exists as chloride anion in the environment and can be very soluble and mobile ⇒ risk for the safety of waste disposal ⇒ its acceptance limit is only 5 Bq/g

#### Determination of <sup>36</sup>Cl in low and intermediate level nuclear waste

<sup>36</sup>Cl is a long-lived beta-emitting radionuclide with both natural and anthropogenic origins.



- <sup>36</sup>Cl is produced from neutron activation of stable <sup>35</sup>Cl present as an impurity in materials.
- <sup>36</sup>Cl can be present in nuclear graphites but also in steels, ion exchange resins, effluents and sludges.
- As a pure beta-emitter, <sup>36</sup>Cl needs to be isolated from the matrix elements and the interfering radionuclides (<sup>60</sup>Co) through chemical purification prior to nuclear measurement, mainly liquid scintillation counting (LSC).





#### **Determination of <sup>36</sup>Cl in nuclear waste**

Literature review: for <sup>36</sup>Cl extraction step, all the published radiochemical methods use the volatile nature of chlorine at high temperatures



#### Determination of <sup>36</sup>Cl in low and intermediate level nuclear waste

■ French M60-332 standard ⇒ two radiochemical methods to characterize <sup>36</sup>Cl in radioactive waste after radiochemical separation



## Radiochemical method only relevant for samples with few $\beta$ and $\gamma$ emitters and with no other halogens or volatile RNs (ex: <sup>129</sup>I)



Method 2 of the French M60-332 standard = CEA method = advanced purification

- Extraction after Cl and Ag addition: oxidative acid digestion in micro-wave oven or thermal decomposition
- AgCl precipitation
- Dissolution of AgCl precipitate using ammonia
- Elimination of Ag by reduction using hydrazine sulfate
- Octadecene\* spiking by chlorine using an oxidant mixture (sulphuric acid + potassium iodate) and dichloromethane
- Recovery of the organic phase containing dichloro-octadecane\*\* and purification on silica gel column using hexane
- Liquid-liquid extraction using diethyl ether and sodium biphenyl
- Back extraction using nitric acid, heating and dilution in water
- Ion chromatography for Cl determination and LSC for <sup>36</sup>Cl determination (LOD ~ a few Bq/g)

Method 2: method based on the chlorination of an alkene



Radiochemical method relevant for all types of radwaste: high selectivity

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Strategies developed to extract <sup>36</sup>Cl in radioactive waste

► Demands to characterize <sup>36</sup>Cl in various types of nuclear waste

- Various amounts to characterize: <1 g up to 10-20 g
- Two types of contamination: in-depth or surface contamination

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## Strategies developed to extract <sup>36</sup>Cl in radioactive waste

### Example 1: steel blocks with surface contamination

- Soft leaching in open reactor to remove only the contamination layers: adaptation of the reactor (flat bottom) to treat large blocks
- Application of digital autoradiography technique to monitor the decontamination steps

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## Strategies developed to extract <sup>36</sup>Cl in radioactive waste

### Example 2: magnesium claddings with in-depth contamination

- Total digestion to decompose the entire samples of ~ 10-15 g
  - Magnesium digested easily in nitric acid but solubility of Mg(NO<sub>3</sub>)<sub>2</sub> limited at room temperature (~ 70-420 g/L at 20 °C) : ~ 100 ml of HNO<sub>3</sub> needed ⇒ not compatible with our micro-wave oven
- Total digestion in open reactor with nitric acid





## Different behaviors of irradiated samples: purification procedures applied to digested or trapping solutions



## <sup>36</sup>Cl measurement at low level



Maximum activity limit in low and intermediate level nuclear waste in France=5 Bq/g and clearance limit in 2013/59 Euratom directive=1 Bq/g

⇒ Application of accelerator mass spectrometry (AMS) to measure <sup>36</sup>Cl at low level

• Sample purified with our in-house radiochemical procedure AgCl precipitate and dissolution in ammonia 2 • Elimination of sulfur precipitation using baryum nitrate 3 AgCl precipitate

 Sample sending to AMS facility to measure <sup>36</sup>Cl/<sup>35</sup>Cl ratio

Necessity to adapt our purification procedure for AMS detection: <sup>36</sup>S elimination (to avoid interferences at m/z **36) and special care to the** laboratory environment and materials (to avoid sample contamination)





► Application of AMS to measure <sup>36</sup>Cl at low level in irradiated steels

- Comparison with LSC measurements



<sup>36</sup> Cl (Bq/g)	LSC	AMS mean
Carbon steel	< 0.5	9.44E-04 (30 %)
Stainless steel	6 (50 %)	2.72 (20 %)



Consistency of the results obtained with the different AMS laboratories and with LSC measurements at CEA

Improvement of <sup>36</sup>Cl detection limit by at least a factor of 500



## **Conclusions and prospects**

#### Determination of <sup>36</sup>Cl in low and intermediate level nuclear waste

- Development of a highly selective radiochemical procedure based on the chlorination of an alkene molecule
  - Initial validation by preparing in-house spiked resins
  - Check of its validity over time by participating to proficiency tests
- Development of different extraction methods to treat all natures of nuclear waste (graphite, concrete, resin, steel, sludge, magnesium cladding...) and all types of contamination (in depth or surface contamination)
  - Potentialities of digital autoradiography to monitor the decontamination steps in case of surface contamination
  - Successful application of AMS to measure <sup>36</sup>Cl at low level

#### Each sample is almost unique: we have to adapt each time !

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# Validation of the developed radiochemical method

### Initial validation

- Lack of certified solid standards for <sup>36</sup>Cl measurement in nuclear waste
- Preparation of in-house solid reference samples in 2 steps



- Initial validation
  - Preparation of **two spiked resins** with low and high activities (40 and 3000 Bq/g)



No bias for <sup>36</sup>Cl analysis in comparison to direct LSC (= reference) whatever the applied procedure including our developed radiochemical purification  $\Rightarrow$  validation

- Quality assurance: validity of the results over time
  - Participation in interlaboratory comparisons and proficiency tests: Environmental Radioactivity Proficiency Test Exercises organized by NPL (UK)



#### z-score < 2 ⇒ trueness of our developed method over time

## Strategies developed to extract <sup>36</sup>Cl in radioactive waste

### Example: irradiated graphites with in-depth contamination

 Extraction step performed with a thermal decomposition by combustion so as to eliminate <sup>14</sup>C more easily



- Preparation of the graphite sample in a boat
- Introduction in the pyrolysis oven (950°C) and addition of oxygen circulation
- Irapping of <sup>36</sup>Cl in bubblers containing sodium carbonate, hydrogen peroxide and water
- A Recovery of the trapping solution and application of our purification procedure
  LSC and ion chromatography measurements
