

Distributed Sensing for Corium Monitoring and Safety – DISCOMS

► Post-Fukushima project

- Total loss of electrical power sources following the tsunami, TEPCO NPP operator with almost no data about the accident status and its evolution ⇒ safety must always prevail

► Aimed at providing innovative solutions based on **passive sensors operated from a remote and safe place**, in order to:

- Monitor the **normal operation** of the reactor during 60+ years
- Monitor the **Severe Accident** to apply *on time* appropriate mitigation strategies & keep informed nuclear safety authorities about:
 - Vessel breakthrough
 - Corium pouring on the floor and its interaction with concrete until the prospective breakthrough
 - Long term corium cooling once relocated in the core catcher (Gen III)

► 2 technologies: *ex-core* long length SPNDs-TC & Distributed OFS



- ***ex-vessel*** measurements designed for **Gen II & Gen III (EPR)**

► 7 partners (Public R&D, Academic R&D, Industrials)

► Ended in Dec. 2018



ex-vessel positions candidates (reactor pit, melt discharge channel & spreading compartment) for long length SPNDs-TC & OFS cables according to framatom specifications



Gen III (EPR)



- currents self-generated under radiations – battery operated capable monitoring system
- long (several meters) lengths SPNDs to get the adequate sensitivity for ex-core detection
- rely on the properties of the backscattered light in optical fibers and reflectometry
- passive sensors with remote measurement systems up to several km away from the NPP area

Information remotely obtained from a safe place, even in case of total loss of power supplies:

(Fukushima 2011 scenario)


- to increase the nuclear safety,
- to reduce operator exposition to ionizing radiations,
- to avoid the breach of 3rd containment barrier & environmental consequences with on-time & appropriate mitigation strategies

SPND current modelling

$$I_{total} \propto \sum_i \phi_n \cdot \sigma_{i(n,\beta^-)} + \sum_i \phi_n \cdot \sigma_{i(n,\gamma)(\gamma,e)} + \sum_i \phi_\gamma \cdot \sigma_{i(\gamma,e)}$$


physical equation implemented in the CEA MATiSSe toolbox for SPND current modelling

- Input data: neutron & gamma energy spectra & fluxes
- Accurate modelling of the SPND and its environment
 - { SPND instrumented pole, concrete, corium } whole set
- MONTE CARLO MCNP6.1 code
 - using JEFF3.2 & ENDF/B-VII.1 libraries
 - 3 main sources:
 - n: rate of (n, β^-) reactions & $(n, \gamma)(\gamma, e)$ contributions
 - e: β^- transport
 - γ: (γ, e) contributions
- MATiSSe code qualified along with several experimental validations

Electronics current amplification device design & qualification

- **1 pA current detection threshold**
 - From Normal Operation to Severe Accident with corium in the vessel (no relocation)
 - Vessel breakthrough with corium pouring on the floor
- **Dedicated amplification device [1 pA 100 nA]**
 - Qualified with ^{60}Co source projector & in research reactor




TRIGA Mark II research reactor (Slovenia)




dedicated SPND multi-channel measurement device
375 mA \times 24 V power per channel
up to 200 m, battery operated




5 orders of magnitude for SPND current

low currents & wide range [1 pA 100 nA] amplification device

Results achieved in DISCOMS project prior to final MCCI VULCANO experiment

- Modelling γ doses & fast neutrons ($E > 1$ MeV) fluence in the reactor pit concrete floor [M. Brovchenko, 2016]
 - Concrete floor shielding provides a good protection against ionizing radiations

from surface to -50 cm	fast neutrons (60 y NO) [n/cm ²]	kerma gamma (60 y NO + 24 h SA) [MGy]
Gen II	from 2×10^{16} to 2×10^{14} $\div 100$	from 5.7 to 0.7 $\div 8.1$
Gen III (EPR)	from 2×10^{14} to 10^{12} $\div 200$	from 2.1 to 0.022 $\div 95$

NO: Normal Operation / SA: Severe Accident

- 60 years NO is the most damaging process in comparison with 24 hours SA
- Rad-Hard optical fibers selection & qualification in γ irradiator [G. Cheymol, 2020]
 - Possible to assess **RIA < 50 dB/km at 2 MGy** at both 1310 nm & 1550 nm wavelengths
 - 100 m per cable in the reactor pit → **5 dB optical budget** for the optical fiber under test
 - Cable **polymer compounds** under ionizing radiations produce molecular H₂
 - Protective carbon layer against diffusion of di-hydrogen H₂ in fiber core is mandatory
- Industrial optical sensor cables incorporating Rad-Hard optical fibers**
 - Compliance to EDF PMUC standard required in the call for tenders



Optical Fibers Sensor (strain, temperature, security) cables qualification

- Tests up to 750°C (circuit integrity) → Severe Accident scenario



tubular oven with optical sensor cable in a pipe (to protect from fumes)



security cable after 2 hours at 750°C



strain sensor cable after heating up to 400°C

Optical fiber continuity during 90 min at 750°C
Tests performed in a tubular oven, cable in a pipe

strain cables	temperature cable	security cable
optical fiber systematically broken between 400°C & 450°C	pass (but not a product specification)	pass

the two most interesting cables are:

- the **security cable** → up to 750°C (90+ min)
- the **strain sensor cable** → earlier break


Concrete crucible instrumentation

- **5 OFS cables connected to 5 optical reflectometers for sensing**

- Photon-counting & telecom **OTDRs** → **cables length**
→ $\{\Delta\varepsilon \text{ & } \Delta T\}$
→ **high-resolution $\{\Delta\varepsilon \text{ & } \Delta T\}$**
→ $\{T\}$

- **2 (SPNDs)-TC poles**



- **Current measurement** on the background cable


concrete crucible installed with the induction coils at CEA in Cadarache
PLINIUS facility

- **50 kg prototypical UO₂ (no radiation)**
 - Corium obtained with strong exothermic thermite reaction
- **100⁺ thermocouples to monitor the temperature propagation front**



Distributed Optical Fiber Sensors measurements during MCCI (animated GIFs)



thermite reaction ignition to produce corium




✓ **corium vicinity detected** only a few minutes after the ignition




Temperature (Optical + SPNDs-TC instrumented poles) measurements during MCCI

- Temperature profiles up to complete cooling at room temperature after 24 hours

OFS: Raman DTS temperature vs. elapsed time at different depths



(SPND)-TC poles: temperature (thermocouple) vs. elapsed time



- ✓ Remote monitoring demonstration successfully achieved during MCCI & post-MCCI

- ✓ Temperature profiles up to 580°C (single excitation wavelength **Raman DTS**)
- ✓ Strain & Temperature changes profiles (**Brillouin** B-OFDA & Rayleigh OFDR)
 - Rayleigh OFDR measurement are very noisy → not suitable for sensing (OK for reflectometry)
- ✓ Cables (optical fibers) lengths obtained with **telecom OTDR**
- ✓ **OFS & SPND-TC temperature measurements in agreement with reference thermocouples**

For NPP instrumentation, it can be advised / recommended

- Long length SPNDs-TC to detect
 - ✓ The reactor shut down,
 - ✓ The onset of the Severe Accident without corium relocation,
 - ✓ The Severe Accident with corium relocation on the concrete floor.
- Optical Fibers Sensor cables to detect
 - ✓ The corium pouring on the concrete floor,
 - ✓ The corium progression through the concrete floor (until its breakthrough),
 - ✓ The corium in the EPR melt discharge channel,

... but also to monitor the corium temperature once relocated in the core catcher.
