### I.WHAT IS A NANOCOMPOSITE?



**Nanocomposite** is a multiphase solid material where one of the phases has one, two or three dimensions of less than 100 nanometers (nm) or structures having nano-scale repeat distances between the different phases that make up the material.


The idea behind nanocomposite is to use **building blocks with dimensions in nanometer range** to design and create **new materials with unprecedented physical properties**.

The mechanical, electrical, thermal, optical, electrochemical, catalytic properties of the nanocomposite will differ markedly from that of the component materials.

### 2. SCINTILLATION IN NANOCOMPOSITES

### Rate equations for emitting excited states in a nanocomposite scintillator

(RAPID DIFFUSION LIMIT)

Sensitizer

$$\frac{\partial}{\partial t}[S^*] = (\alpha \underline{C_S} - \beta \underline{C_E} - \underline{\sigma})\underline{N} - \underline{k_{0,S}}[S^*] - \underline{k_{ET}}[S^*]$$

Emitter

$$\frac{\partial}{\partial t}[E^*] = (\beta C_E - \alpha C_S - \sigma)N - k_{0,E}[E^*] + k_{ET}[S^*]$$

 $C_S$  and  $C_E$ : sensitizer and emitter concentration.

 $\alpha$  and  $\beta$ : free charges capture rate constants for the sensitizer and emitter

 $\sigma$  is a loss rate constant determined by the matrix characteristics.

 $k_{0,S}$  and  $k_{0,E}$  are the spontaneous recombination rates of the sensitizer/emitter excited states

*N* is the total number of electron/hole pairs generated in the material.

 $k_{ET}$  interaction rate











### Perovskite nanocrystals based composite scintillators





- CsPbBr<sub>3</sub> (NCs) defects tolerance, tuneable properties, QY 75%
- 2. High Z NCs to stop the ionizing radiation
- Conjugated red organic emitter(1) with QY 60%, 60 nm Stokes shift between absorption and emission spectra and fast lifetime (4 ns in PMMA) Large stokes shift → suppression of reabsorption
- 4. PMMA: radiation hardness, optical quality, low absorption in VIS






- RL intensity of the nanocomposite is comparable to that of the commercial scintillators
- Estimated LY of NC-1-PMMA nanocomposite comparable to ~9,000 photons/MeV
- RL of 1 is 30-fold stronger in the nanocomposite sensitization
- Considering the fast decay time of the nanocomposite emission with no slow scintillation tails






### Sensitization → low emitters concentration → reabsorption-free scintillator



Intensity small drop (~25%) in ~12 cm (see also MonteCarlo simulation).

- → Reabsorption is negligible
- → QY of dye is preserved, and light waveguided across the scintillator length
- → Red emission suitable for scintillating heterostructure







### MOF nanocrystals based composite scintillators

### MOF = metal organic framework crystalline systems


- Tunable structure/composition
- Cost effective synthesis and processing
- MOF architecture preserve the properties of constituent fluorophore









- MOF: zirconium oxo-hydroxy as heavy node + organic scintillator (DPA) as ligand (QY 96%, t=6ns ns)
- High Z elements
- Close packed sensitizers/ligands to have ultrafast nonradiative ET
















Detection test: 60Co γ-ray source (1,173.2 and1,332.5 keV)






Hetero-ligand MOFs shows large scintillation yield than homo-ligand MOFs thanks to the Stokes shift



#### PDMS, 0.5% wt MOF loading, 5 mm thickness








#### How to improve the sensitivity of x-ray imaging detectors











X-ray imaging scintillator based on the D-A nanocomposite film exhibits a 400 um resolution and a detection limit of 256 nGy/s














### 5. CONCLUSIONS

- ☐ The scintillation in composite materials can be achived and tuned, to be exploited to obtain better scintillators with tailored emission properties.
- ☐ The nanocomposite concept opens to way to different strategies to surpass classical scintillators by realizing new design concepts devices or materials with better engineered composition.
  - Test on heterostrucures and porous systems are ongoing
- I WARNING: the composite developement is strictly related to the application.
- 2° WARNING: The problem of the low density of classical composites based on polymers is not yet completely solved.



### MODELING THE LIGHT PROPAGATION IN SMALL NANOCOMPOSITES




#### For small size scintillator

The number of re-absorption/emission events of the light entrapped in the scintillators is small


 $\phi_{scint}$  determined by self-absorption, scattering effects are negligible (Intensity of light reaching the detector decreases of 0.25 even at the max  $\alpha$ )

Light scattering induces a pulse broadening of 50 ps, relevant for  $\tau$ rise



### ULTRAFAST TOF-PET REQUIRES NEW SCINTILLATORS











### Scintillating MOF Nanocrystals

- Unaltered ground state properties of conjugated ligands
- Tailored structure and porosity
- PLQY partially limited by surface quenching of diffusing excitons.






**cubic crystal structure** (space group Fm-3m). The Zr-based nodes  $(Zr_6(m_3-O)_4(m_3-OH)_4(CO_2)_{12}$  clusters) have 12-coordinated ligands which connect the nodes in the 3D framework while the DPA units are disordered over three positions

The DPA residual emission lifetime is shortened and constant upon dilution:


ET is an intracrystal process.


The DPT emission lifetime matches the single molecule: **FULL PROTECTION** from quenching



# NANO-MOF AND NANOCOMPOSITES PHOTOLUMINESCENCE







### Measurements and estimation of the parameters: LY

Pulse height spectrum recorded by a SiPM photodetector coupled to the nanocomposites  $^{60}$ Co  $\gamma$ -ray source (1,173.2 and1,332.5 keV).

PHOTOELECTRIC PEAK IS DIFFUCULT TO OBSERVE IN LOW DENSITY AND INHOMOGEONEUS MATERIALS

Estimation of the intrinsic scintillation yield  $\phi_{scint}$  is 821 ± 82 photons per MeV

- Total number of emitted photon  $n_{em}$
- Detected photons  $n_{exp} = \beta \rho \chi n_{em}$ ,

where  $\beta = 0.26$  is the geometrical detection efficiency \* and  $\chi = 0.3$  is the quantum efficiency of the photo-detector,  $\rho = 0.78$  is an empirical correction factor from comparison with a certified plastic scintillator EJ-276 as the reference.

 $n_{exp}$  = maximum number of active cells = 56 photons = max E deposited by Compton = 1,12 MeV from the  $^{60}$ Co  $\gamma$ -rays

n<sub>em</sub> =821±82 photons/MeV

confirmed by independent relative measurement made with  $^{22}$ Na and a SiPM using BGO as a reference  $\phi_{scint}$  = 1,160 ± 350 photons per MeV
