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Context

- Tracing or "fingerprinting" methods are used to identify sediment sources and quantify the dynamics of particle-bound contaminants.
- The use of these techniques is often associated with several methodological and statistical limitations.
- These are often reported, but **rarely adressed** in the framework of concerted actions.

- AIM: Concrete suggestions to improve the design and implementation of tracing methods.

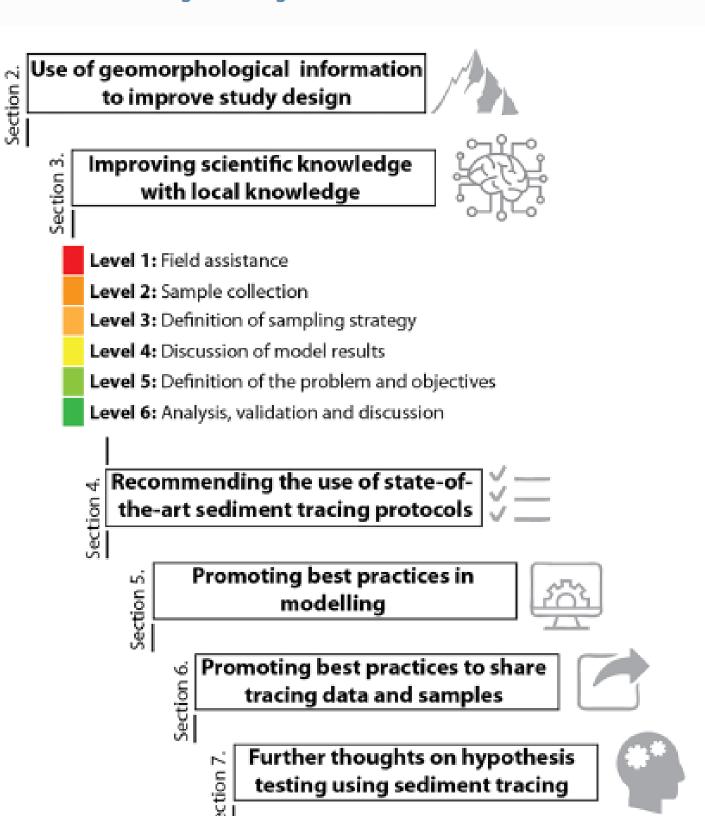


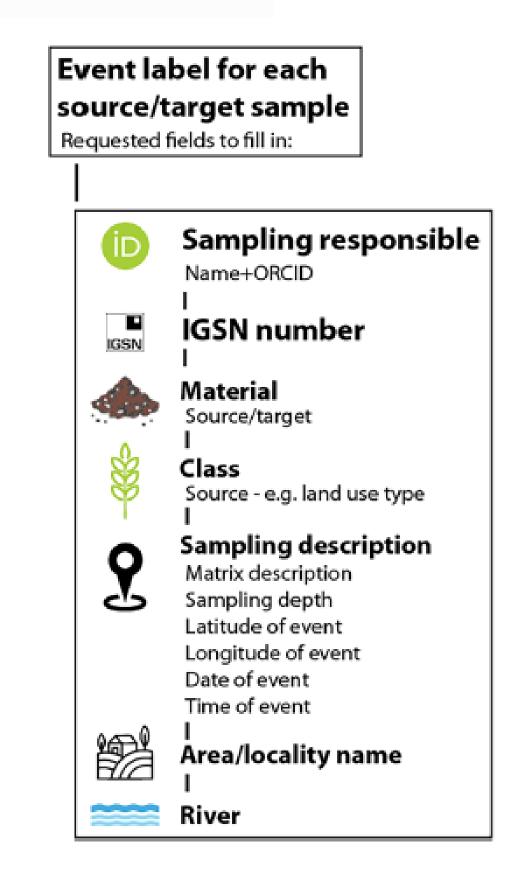

- 1. Use geomorphological information:
 - scrutinize all the knowledge available on the catchment,
 - obtain multiple lines of evidence regarding sediment contrib.
- 2. Improve scientific knowledge with local expertise:
 - describe different levels of involvement of locals in research.
- 3. Use state-of-the-art sediment tracing protocols to conduct sampling:
 - deal with particle size, examine data before modelling,
 - account for the hydro-meteorological context.
- 4. Best practices in modelling:
 - run multiple models and select appropriate tracers,
 - report on model errors and uncertainty.
- 5. Share tracing data and samples:
 - increase the visibility of the fingerprinting technique.
- 6. Formulation of hypotheses:
 - improve the knowledge about erosion and sediment transport processes in a more unified way.

International Tracing Day (2022–2023)

- 2022 and 2023, before the EGU, an International Study Day took place
- AIM: Practical plans to make progress regarding three main issues:
 - 1. design of tomorrow's tracers,
 - 2. optimized modelling methods,
 - 3. organisation of an inter-comparison tracing exercise.

- ⇒ Need to compile international ensemble of data sets (and possibly samples) with the same format to test hypotheses.
- ⇒ Increase the visibility of our community and its ability to address the ongoing scientific/societal challenges.



Organic matter, geochemical and colorimetric properties of potential source material, target sediment and laboratory mixtures for conducting sediment fingerprinting approaches in the Mano Dam Reservoir (Hayama Lake) catchment, Fukushima Prefecture, Japan.

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Upcoming actions

- Preparation of a data paper with a sufficient number of sediment tracing datasets in contrasted environmental contexts,
- Presentation of the approach and testing a common research hypothesis.
