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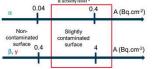
Context and Challenges



Challenges

- Discrimination between noncontaminated surfaces and low-level contaminated surfaces
- Very large areas
- Non-flat surfaces







Needs

- > Reliable contamination measurements
- > Calibration of measurement systems

- > Traceable activity and emitted flux
- Large surface areas
- Non-contaminating surface (use on-site)
- Complex shapes



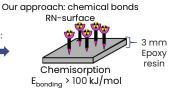


Polymeric surfaces

RN dried + protected Al thickness: 3 mm

Adsorption / Physisorption E_{bonding} ~ kJ/mol

Commercial sources

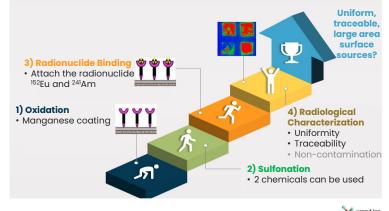


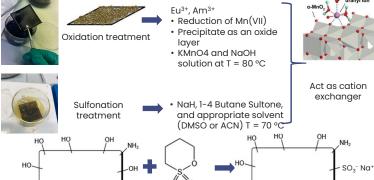
Emitted particles

Use of **functionalization**

- Strong chemical bonds → No cover layer
- Thin sources → Minimize self-absorption

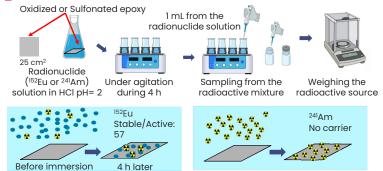
Our Approach

Experimental set up & radiological characterization



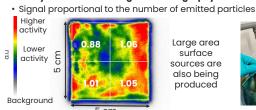
Total amount of element in solution in both cases: ~0.45 picomole

Sulfonated (F3)	¹⁵² Eu	$(87.5 \pm 2.7)\%$	15.5 ± 0.5
Sulfonated (G3)	¹⁵² Eu	$(86.0 \pm 2.7)\%$	17.0 ± 0.5
Sulfonated DMSO (H6)	¹⁵² Eu	(76.5 ± 2.6)%	15.5 ± 0.5

We have produced surface sources with activities ~17 Bq/cm². The surface activity can be tuned to meet specific needs. Reproduce complex shapes including roughness

📤 Analysis after RN binding: Autoradiography



Large area surface sources are also being produced
