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LCA results profiling and visualization

An application to R&D in the Powder Metallurgy sector to facilitate information assimilation and eco-design actions

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CONTEXT

Life Cycle Assessment results are often subject to misinterpretations by industrial players due to the need for specific

knowledge to understand their complexity and completeness [1]. In the context of the H2020 SUPREME project we proposed to the Powder Metallurgy (PM) R&D experts a document called a "Process Environmental Profile" that gives a visual representation of the environmental performance of their area of expertise. This document aimed to be a support to get technical R&D experts to draw the conclusions usually made by LCA experts, and to facilitate eco-design actions implementation in the PM value chain.

METHOD

The objective of this work was to build a **simple 2 pages document** to restitute in a clear way the LCA results of the different **powder metallurgy processes** evaluated in SUPREME (38 in total).

The structure of the final document is inspired from FDES [2] and Product Environmental Profile format of the PEP Ecopassport program [3] and adapted to a R&D context. This format has been tested by PM SUPREME R&D experts during a workshop (Fig 1.) A questionnaire has been developed and sent to partners with their PEP to help them to identify environmental hotspots and eco-design **levers** for their processes and potential for PEP improvements (*Fig 2.*)

CONCLUSION

The PEP developed in the framework of the SUPREME project helped the integration of eco-design actions and LCA results interpretation for R&D processes optimization. Several improvements regarding CO2 emissions, metals and minerals resources and energy consumption were realized during the project to reach a more sustainable powder metallurgy value chain from mineral extraction to parts manufacturing (by additive and near net shape processes).
