Nuclear Reaction Analysis

Goal is to measure T trapped in materials to depths of a few micrometers. It relies on the detection of products (d, p) from the nuclear reaction between ³He and T. First measurements by ³He beam with energies from 0.7 MeV to 5 MeV on T₂ gas loaded W sample pre-irradiated by 20 MeV W ions show a small but measurable signal around 7.5 MeV increasing with ³He impact energy. Autoradiography

With Autoradiography, we are currently testing a new type of autoradiographic camera based upon Silicon Photo Multipliers (SiPM) detectors closely connected The LIBS development relies on picosecond laser interaction with the material with solid scintillators. It will allow rapid measurements of T contamination. An producing a thermal plasma and allowing measuring the T mole fraction and its industrial device was built in 2019 and T sources were tested. (2) The second tested system for autoradiography is based on solid scintillators which emit photons when exposed to radiations. The light is collected using 64 SiPM, a fairly new type of photosensors, with high gain, large photodetection efficiency and low voltage bias.

The industrial device called MAUD (Digital Autoradiography Measurement) has been tested on tritium source and an autoradiography image was obtained.

First result: Autoradiography is a very efficient technique for tritium measurement on solid surface

Laser Induced Breakdown Spectroscopy (LIBS)

Preparation of the samples The samples are prepared by laser deposition of target (W or Al) on substrates in a H_2/D_2 low pressure atmosphere.

First attempts under ps/ns double pulse The ps pulse (τ_1 =30 ps, λ_1 =1064 nm, E₁=20 mJ) is focused on the sample using a lens of 125 mm focal length. The nanosecond pulse (τ_2 =6 ns, λ_2 = 532 nm, E_2 = 50 mJ) is delayed by Δt_{1-2} =350 ns and is tangentially focused (with a lens of 150 mm focal length) in the plasma produced by the ps pulse at a distance H (=0 or 1 mm) + 0.62 mm above the sample's surface.



Spectral images are observed on the sensor and lead to spectra compared with calculated ones assuming the Local Thermodynamic Equilibrium of the plasma. The composition is then determined. The lowest measurable H mole fraction is ~ 0.5 %. For LIBS see also poster No. 332 (Bultel et al.)
