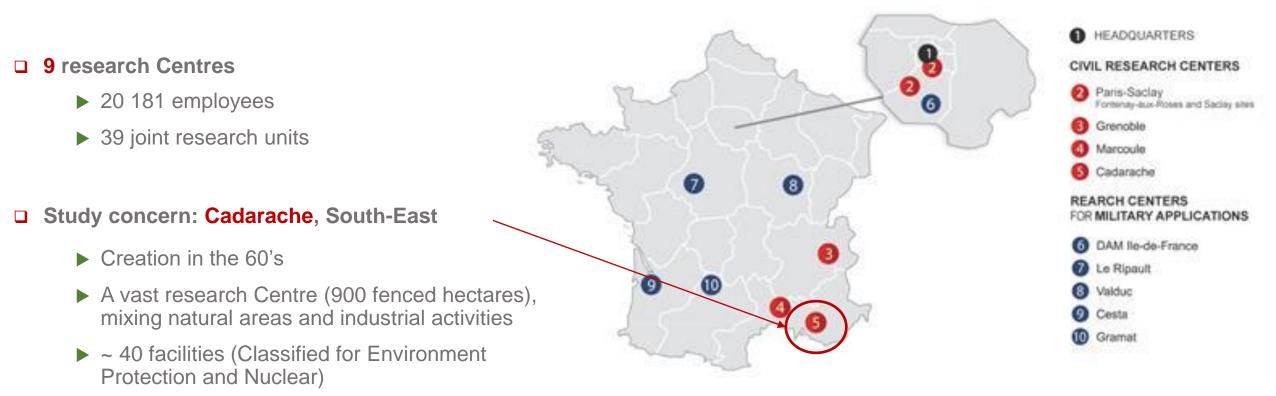

- French Alternative Energies and Atomic Energy Commission (CEA) is a key player in research, development and innovation in four main areas:
 - defense and security,
 - low carbon energies (nuclear and renewable energies),
 - ► technological research for industry,
 - ▶ fundamental research in physical sciences (matter and universe, climate and environment), health and life sciences.



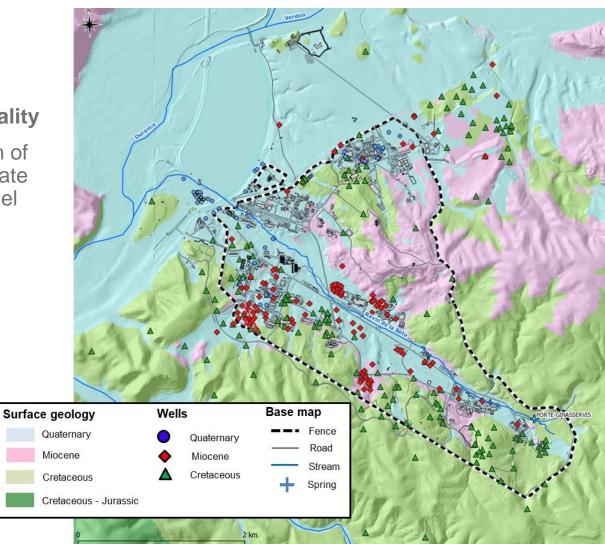
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- A complex geological and hydrological context: 3 superimposed aquifers (Quaternary, Miocene and Cretaceous)
- □ A quite dense groundwater monitoring network...
 - Currently: ~ 400 wells
 - Dedicated to the survey of both groundwater levels and quality
 - Which has continuously evolved since the 60's as a function of different needs: survey of new facilities, knowledge of flow rate and directions, improvement of the 3D hydrogeological model used for flow and transport simulations, etc.

□ ... to be optimized!

- Number and spatial distribution
- ▶ (Too?) dense near facilities, lack in certain areas

1. Characterising piezometry

Principal data

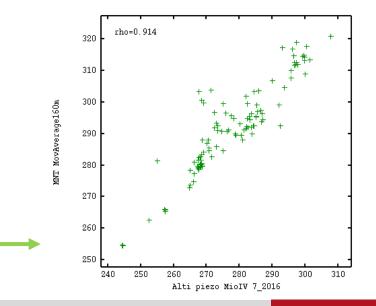
- ▶ 11 years of annual/biennial hydraulic heads data, covering a large panel of hydrological conditions: low to high water levels.
- Digital Elevation Model (mesh 20 x 20m)
- ► 3D geological model: top/bottom of geological formations

Optimization objectives and criteria

- ► Better knowledge of the piezometry at site's scale → Reducing uncertainties linked to hydraulic heads estimation
- ► Monitoring network able to detect an eventual pollution and its migration → Focus on downstream from facilities
- Optimize the number and spatial distribution of wells

Based on kriged piezometric maps

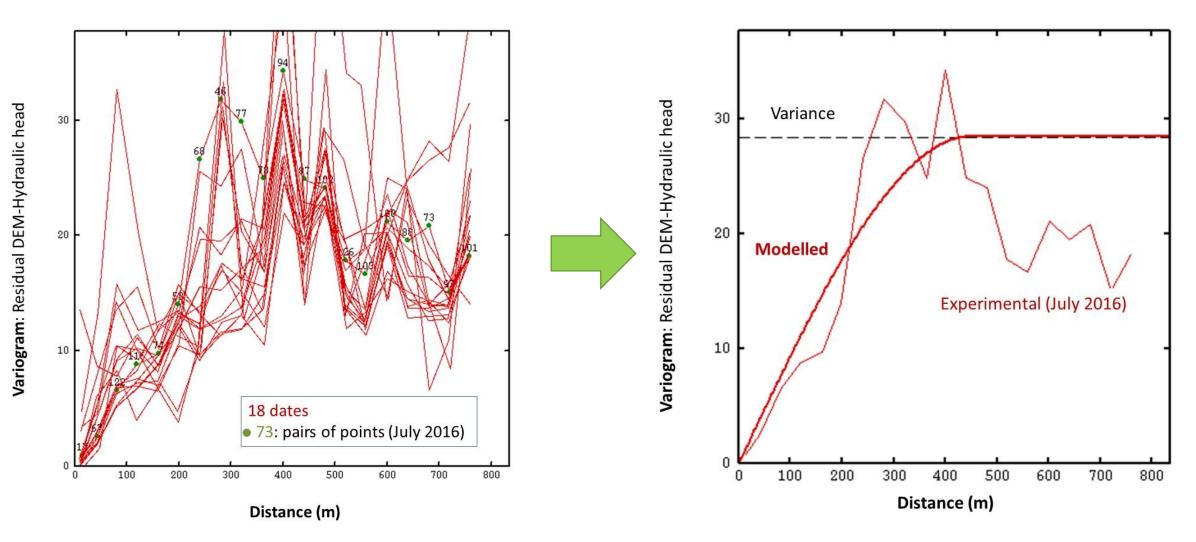
- ► Variograms calculated on hydraulic heads surveys for 18 dates
- Corresponding head distributions constructed by **kriging**, mesh 2 x 2 m.
- For Quaternary/Miocene aquifers, as hydraulic heads and elevations are correlated, smoothed Digital Elevation Model is used as external drift.
- Residual variable: DEM hydraulic head (m)





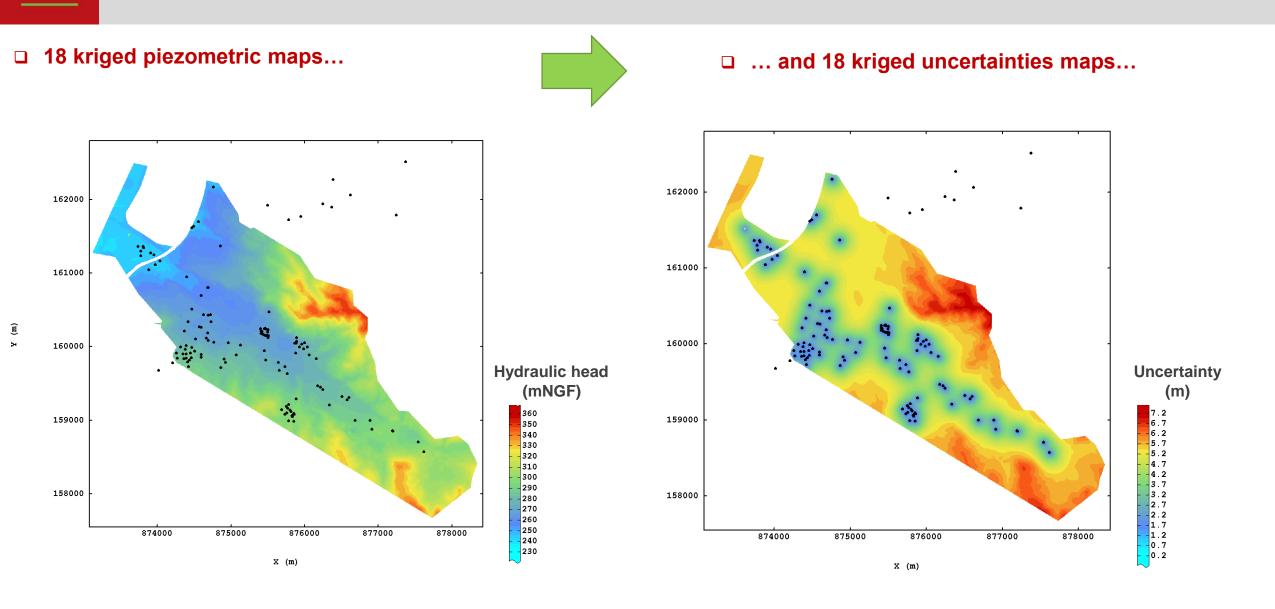
□ 18 experimental variograms

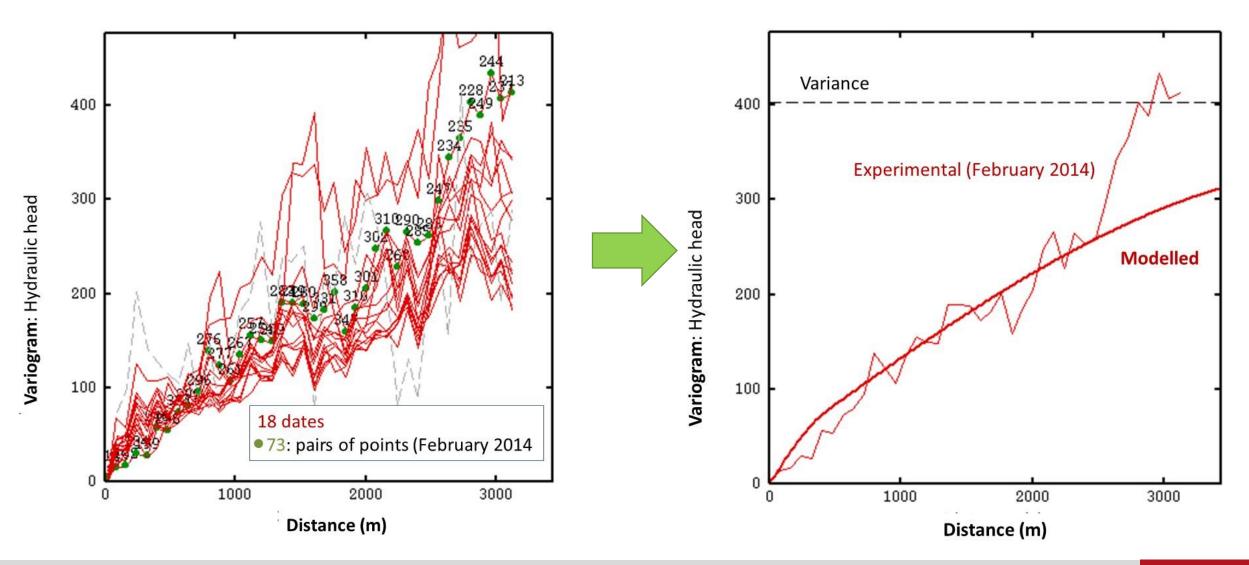

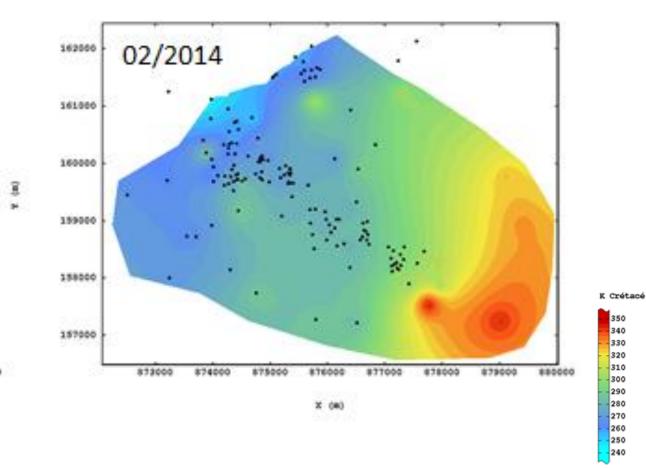


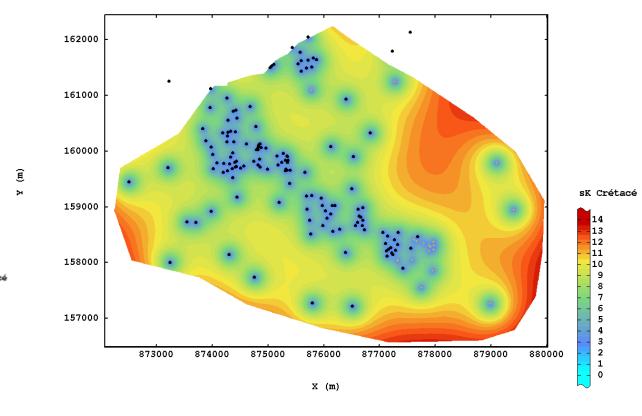
Ceal 1. Characterising piezometry - Results for the Cretaceous aquifer

2. Elements for a specific survey of facilities

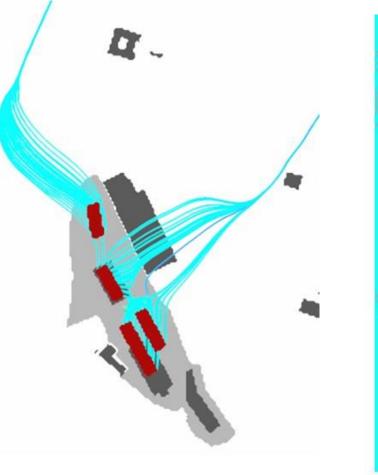
□ Objective:

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- Monitoring network able to detect an eventual pollution and its migration
- Having a better knowledge of the flows (directions and dispersion) downstream from facilities

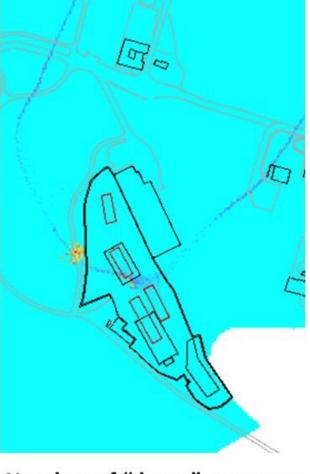
Principle: Use of "drops" trajectories

- Virtual "drops" put down on areas of interest (facilities, buildings, etc.)
- Calculation of the trajectories of these drops down to the kriged piezometric map (medium supposed to he homogeneous, constant velocity, no boundary conditions)
- ► Trajectories are calculated for each date (18)
 → ~ "dispersion" due to different hydrogeological conditions
- Number of drop passages are counted on the regular kriged grid

starting from buildings



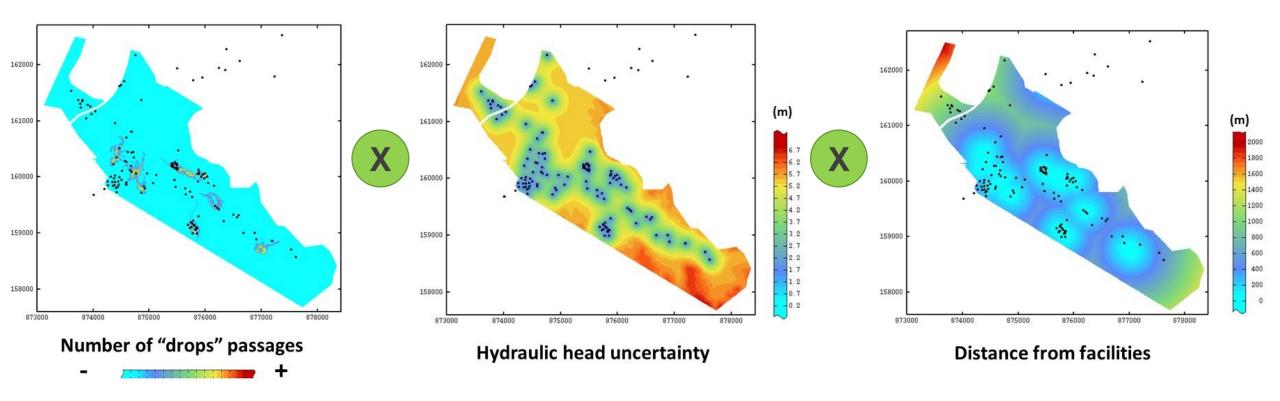
Number of "drops" passages



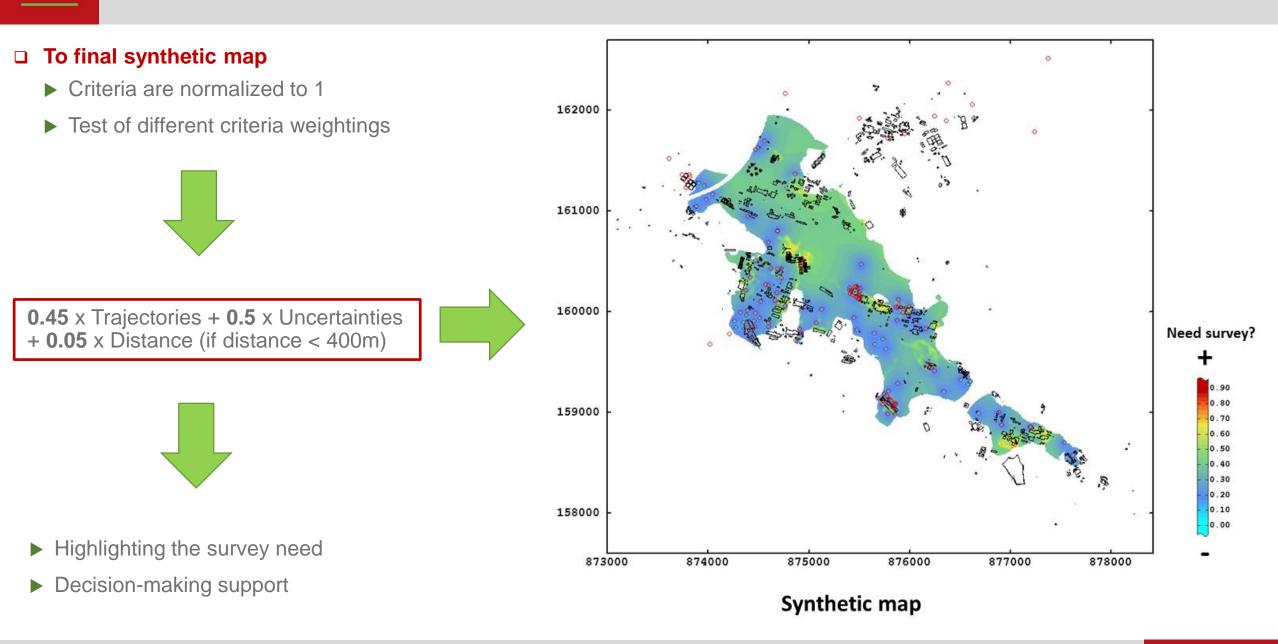
2. Elements for a specific survey of facilities

Synthetic and multi-criteria maps to help for optimizing the existing monitoring network

- **Criteria 1**: Map of trajectories (~ flow direction and dispersion) from facilities of interest
- ► Criteria 2: Map of uncertainties on hydraulic head
- ► Criteria 3: Map of distance from facilities

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3. Adding new wells

Criteria for adding new wells

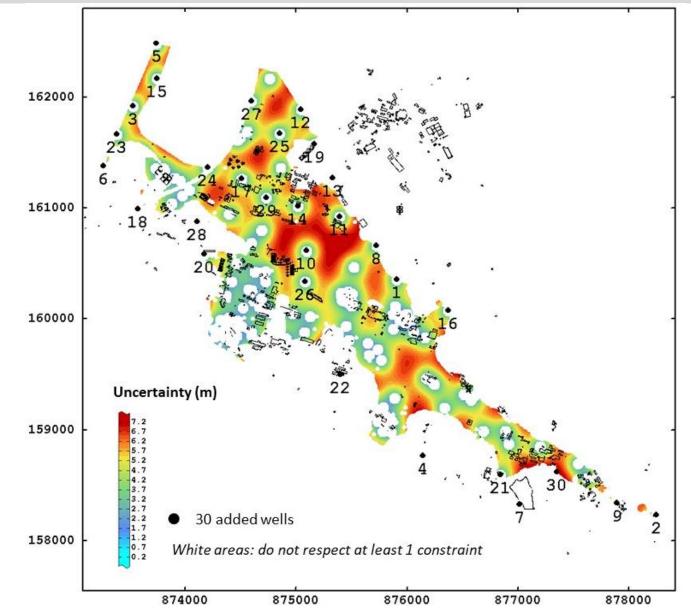
- Sequential implantation
- Priority in areas with high uncertainty on hydraulic head
- Objective: decreasing the uncertainty on hydraulic head in zones with few information

2 constraints all along the sequential process

- Distance to existing or new added wells > 50 m
- Thickness of the geological layer (estimated with 3D model) > 10 m

□ Sequential addition of 30 wells

- ► Final synthetic map
- ▶ White areas: do not respect at least one constraint

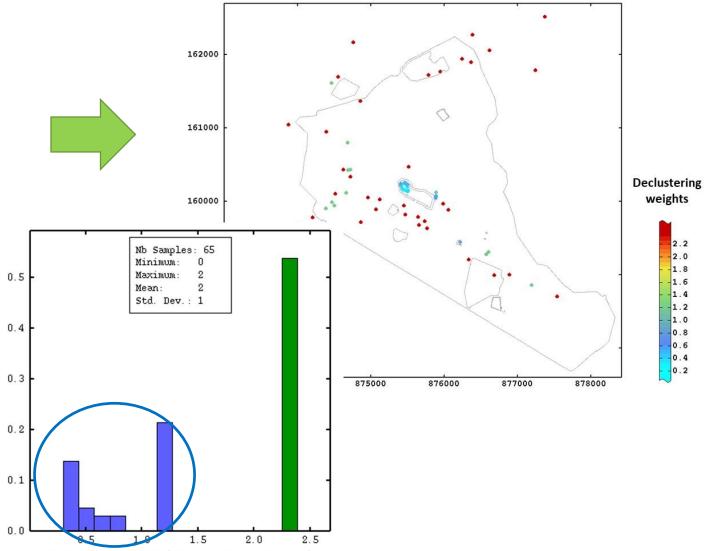


Criteria for removing existing wells

- Sequential removal
- Criteria of geometrical redundancy
- Definition of declustering weights: all the more important as a well is isolated
- Test of different declustering radius (25 to 250 m) to highlight wells groups and prioritize wells to be removed



- Declustering process
 - Declustering radius: 100m
 - ▶ 65 wells identified
 - Low weight \rightarrow 30 wells proposed for removal

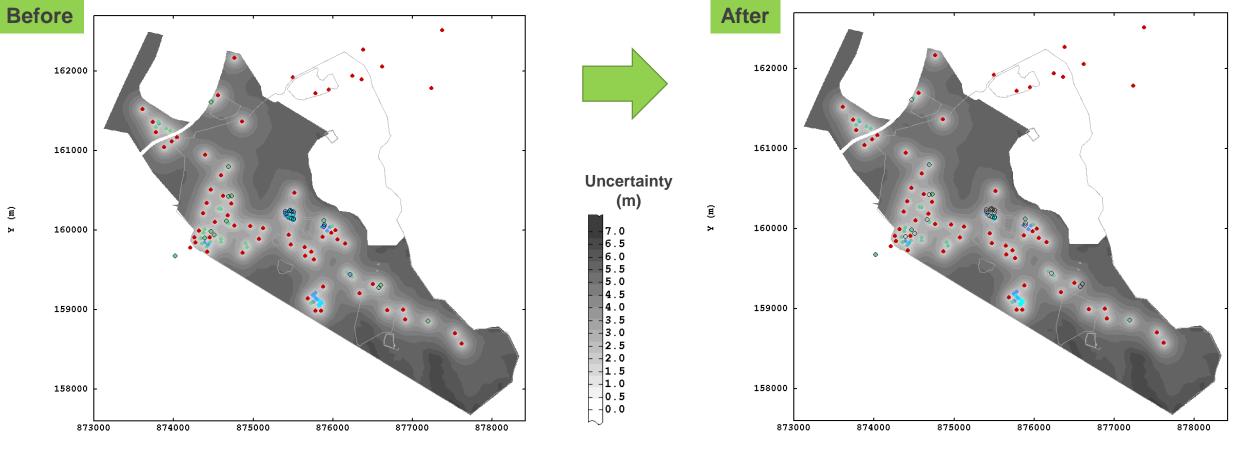


Declustering weights (Radius: 100m, July 2016)

Frequencies

Impact of ~30 wells' removal

- ► Kriging of hydraulic head is done again, without the removed wells
- Differences invisible on piezometry, very low on uncertainties



Conclusions and perspectives

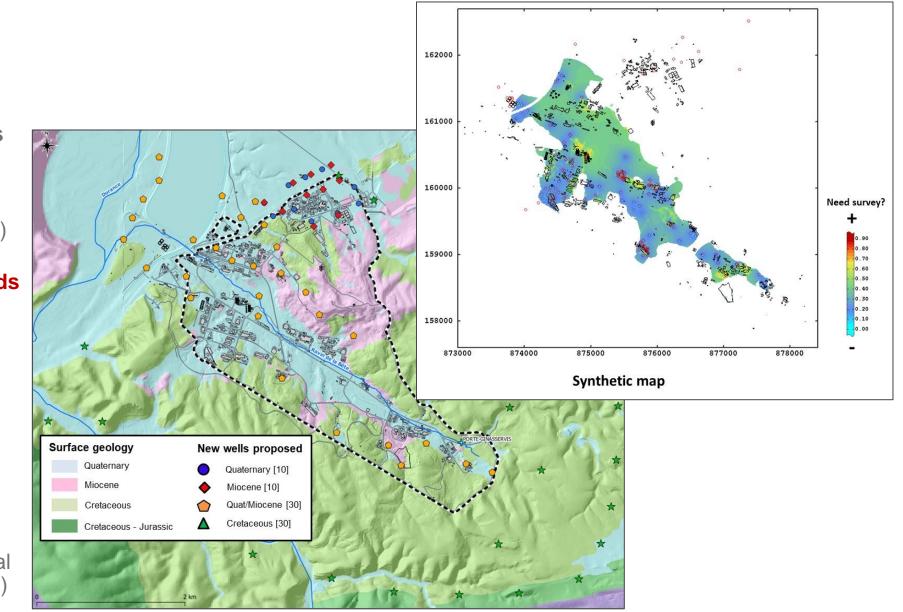
□ 3 principal results

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- Highlighting survey need linked to facilities (~ quality survey)
- Propositions for adding new wells (~ best knowledge of piezometry)
- Propositions for removing existing wells (~ limit redundancy)
- □ Interests of geostatistical methods
- Optimal utilisation of piezometric data in different flow conditions
- ► Automated and sequential process → test of different configurations and criteria

□ Uses?

- Used to add new wells
- To be completed by hydrogeological expertise (faults, access for engine)
