Methodology

□ Aim: incorporation of 20%Vol. of assembled oil and grease into geopolymer **Rheological characterization** for assembled oil and grease with low viscosity solvent (choice of assembling rate), comparison between C12 and the mix of TBP/C12 **D** Micro-calorimetry analysis of geopolymer with assembled oil and grease **Microstructure analysis** of droplets network (MEB and micro-tomography) **Compressive strength characterization** at 28 days (aim more than 8 MPa) **Leaching behavior** with organic carbon measurements in lime water (under study)

Geopolymerization

Viscous organics wastes

Issue: Processing of historical nuclear waste with a high viscosity \rightarrow Direct Solidification/Stabilization route impossible

Solution: Assembling with low viscosity solvent as dodecane (C12) or mix of TBP/C12 (30/70% Vol. respectively) for a double elimination **Previous works:** Possible incorporation of oil in literature^{[1]-[6]}

Assembly of oil and grease

Grease → Non-Newtonian **Differents rheological behavior:** Oil → Newtonian **Assembling rate choice:** Low rate for Oil (20-30%vol.) & High rate for Grease (70-80%vol.) Viscosity (C12) = 1,32 mPa.s & Viscosity (TBP^{30%}/C12^{70%}) = 1,90 mPa.s at 25°C

Geopolymer with assembled oil and grease



Mix of TBP/C12 (30/70%Vol)





Microstructure analysis







No oil/grease coalescence on the samples surface

Increase of the viscosity in the case of:

- Presence of additives in oil (comparison between industrial and model oil);
- Use of mix TBP/C12 as assembling solvent;
- No impact of TBP/C12 in case of industrial oil (i.e. with additives).

Micro-calorimetry analysis: No impact of organics liquids on the poly-condensation of the geopolymer

Mechanical performance (compressive strength) about 30 MPa at 28 days (superior to the 8 MPa limit of ANDRA specifications)



Conclusion

- For assembled oil less, homogeneity of droplets with a size less than 10 µm whatever the assembling solvent used;
- For assembled grease, bigger droplets in case of C12 (10-30 μ m) than TBP (10 μ m with a few drops larger) as assembled solvent;
- Potential effect of TBP as a surfactant that could explain a better incorporation for the assembled grease.

Prospects:

- Leaching studies of assembled oils/grease geopolymer composites (GEOIL)
- Durability tests of GEOIL with greases and viscous oils
- Choice of direct incorporation route by assembling process with low viscosity solvents
 - > Possibility to decrease the viscosity of oils by assembly with low solvent content
 - Possibility to make greases fluid by assembling with a high quantity of solvent
- Possibility of using the TBP/Dodecane mixture (30/70) as an assembly solvent (double elimination in a single stabilization/solidification process)
- Simple method of application in radioactive environment
- Mechanical resistance of materials of the order of 30 MPa
- Regardless of the solvent used or the oil or grease incorporated \rightarrow low droplets size

assembled with surfactant

- On-going work on the influence of different environments on the evolution of the porous network of geopolymers
- Study of the network of oil droplets according to the assembly of oils and greases (X-ray micro-tomography)
