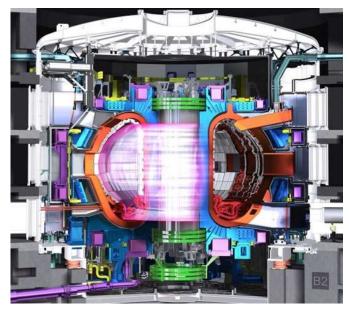

# **The ITER Tokamak**



| Major radius             | 6,2 m           |
|--------------------------|-----------------|
| Minor radius             | 2,0 m           |
| Plasma volume            | $837  m^3$      |
| Core $T_e$               | Up to 40 keV    |
| Plasma facing components | <b>W</b> , , SS |

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#### ITER goals:

- Demonstrate the experimental feasibility of a nuclear fusion reactor
- $P_{fusion} = 500MW$ ,  $P_{heating} = 50MW$  for 400 to 600 seconds
- Achieve  $Q \ge 10$

- Superconducting tokamak
- Actively cooled Plasma Facing Components
- Steady state heating / fueling / pumping / diags systems
- Large current drive capability (LHCD),
- ECRH/ECCD in preparation
- ► ICRH (large heating power ...)
- ▶ Dominant e- heating, no external torque → relevant for transport studies
- ▶ Compact divertor with good diagnostic access → test bed for plasma edge modelling

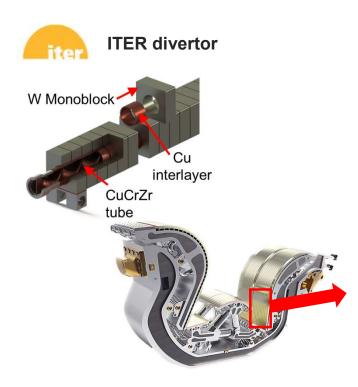


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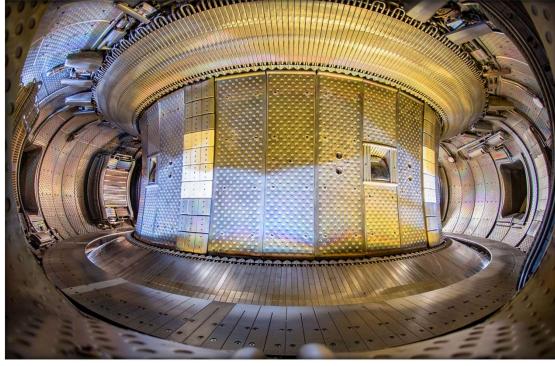
Long pulse operation -> 1000 s



## **Inside WEST : a full W environment**



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Full W environment (W coatings on CuCrZr/CFC, W bulk)
 ITER grade divertor prototypes tested on the lower divertor (same monoblock geometry, same thermohydraulic conditions)

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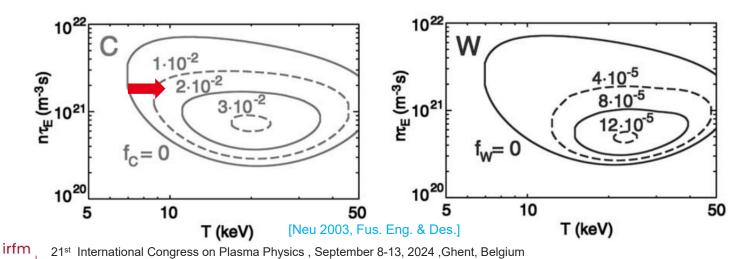
# Why W is chosen?

#### Advantages of W (tungsten) over C (carbon):

- · Higher heat flux resilience
- Lower neutron activation
- Lower tritium retention
- Lower erosion

#### Main drawback of W over C:

Plasma ignition domains for various impurity concentrations :

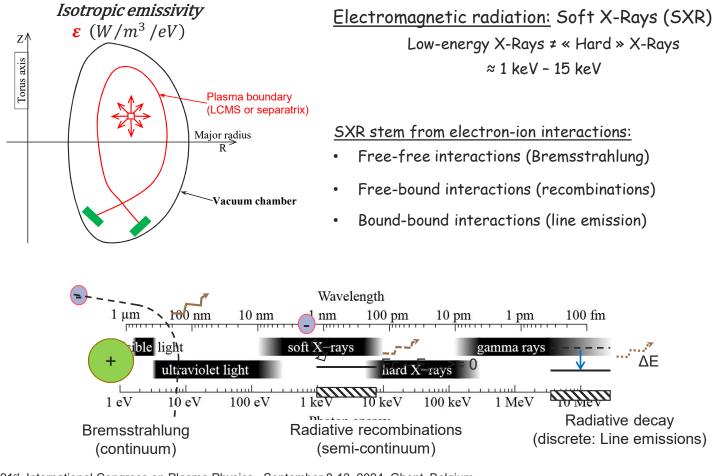


Significant radiation in the plasma core, in the soft X-ray (SXR) range,  $c_W \sim 10^{-4}$  sufficient to decrease significantly ITER fusion performances,  $n_W$  must be **measured** and monitored



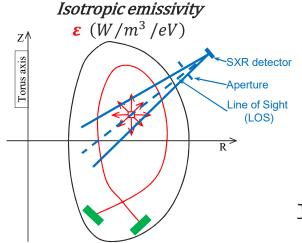

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## How to measure radiation and get local emissivity? $\mathbf{V}$



Electromagnetic radiation: Soft X-Rays (SXR)

$$\varepsilon = \sum_{S} \varepsilon_{S} = n_{e} \sum_{S} n_{S} L_{S} = f(T_{e}, n_{e}, n_{S,q})$$

The SXR emissivity conveys a lot of information:

- Electron temperature and density
- Impurity distributions (transport...)

The plasma is optically thin to SXR:

- $\Rightarrow$  No re-absorption
- $\Rightarrow$  Straightforward and non-intrusive measurements

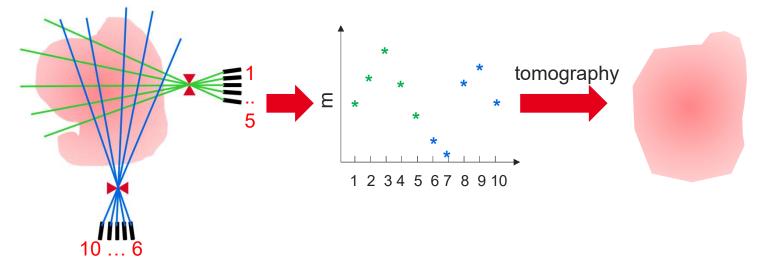
Measurements: 
$$m_i = \iiint_{V_i} \int_0^\infty \varepsilon \times \eta \ d(h \nu) dV = \iiint_{V_i} \varepsilon^\eta \ dV$$

But the measurements are: •

- Spatially integrated
  - Spectrally integrated
  - Summation of all contributions of all species (and ions) in the plasma
  - Summation of 3 different contributions (ff, fb & bb) for each ion



# How to get the emissivity?



#### Tomographic algorithm:

Finds the solution which fits best the measurement while retaining some physical sense. Example with Tikhonov regularization:

$$\varepsilon_{rec} = \arg\min_{\varepsilon} \left( |m - f(\varepsilon)|^2 + \lambda R(\varepsilon) \right)$$

Regularization using the Minimum Fisher Information:

 $d\varepsilon(r)$ 

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dr

Minimizes 
$$I_F = \int \frac{1}{\varepsilon(r)}$$

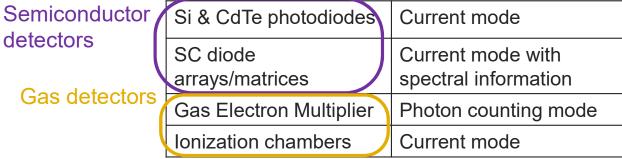

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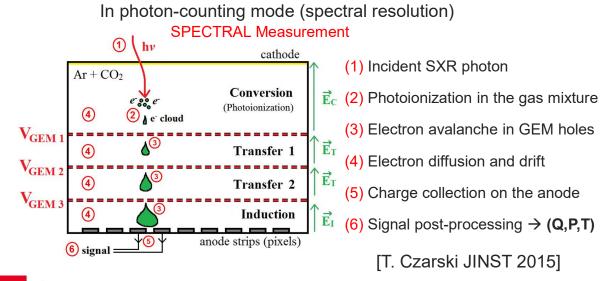

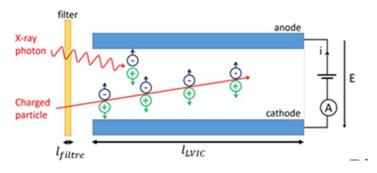


#### Principle of the triple-GEM (Gas Electron Multiplier):

In current mode



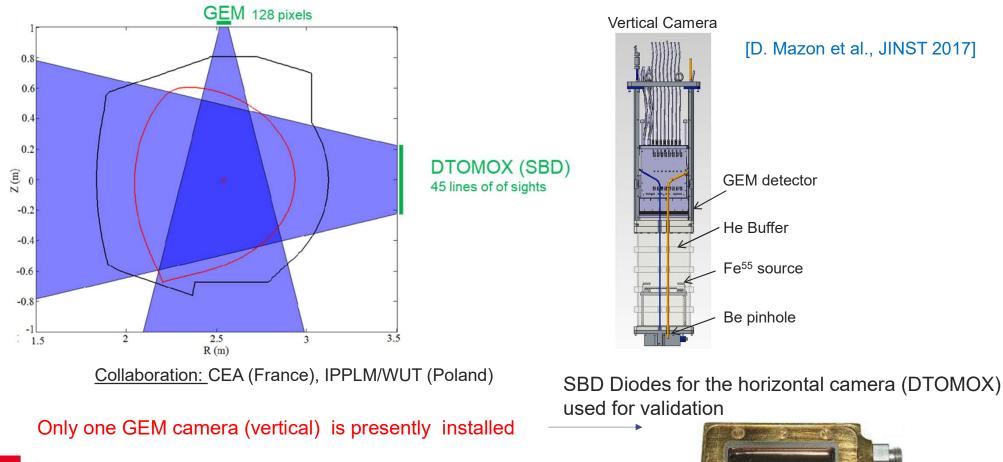

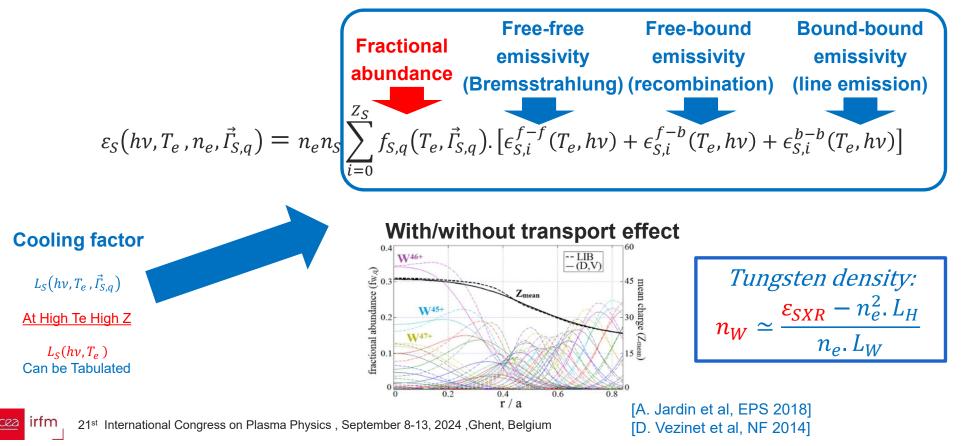

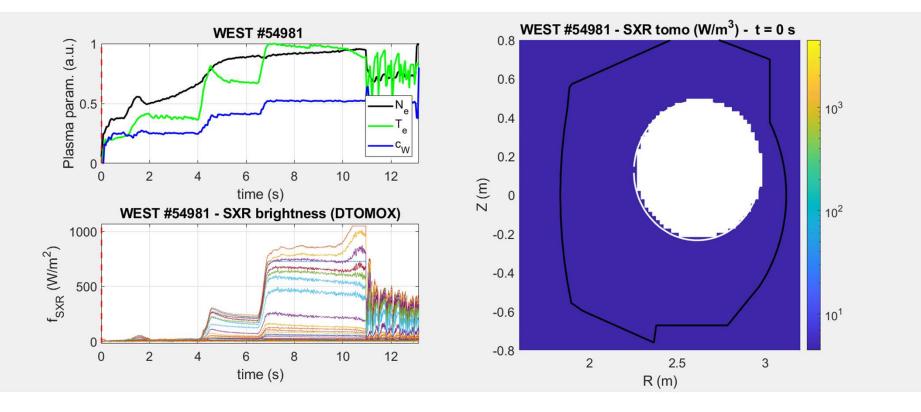

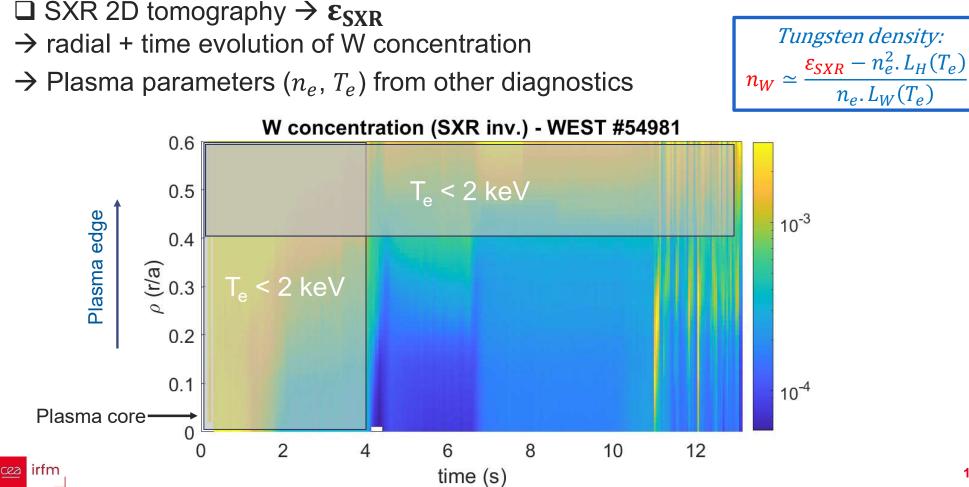

# **2nd method: Bayesian inference**

Bayes' theorem:

$$p(\vec{\theta}|\vec{d}) \propto p(\vec{d}|\vec{\theta})p(\vec{\theta})$$

- $\vec{\theta}$ : unknown parameters
- $\vec{d}$ : experimental data
- $p(\vec{d}|\vec{\theta})$ : **likelihood**, related to  $\chi^2$
- $p(\vec{\theta})$ : **prior distribution**, applying physical constraints and regularizations

Point (Maximum a posteriori, MAP) estimate:

 $\vec{\theta}_{\text{MAP}} = \underset{\vec{\theta}}{\operatorname{argmax}} p(\vec{\theta} | \vec{d})$   $\longrightarrow$  Can be obtained using generic optimization algorithms.

Posterior distribution  $p(\vec{\theta}|\vec{d})$ :

- Natural uncertainty quantification (width of the posterior distribution )
- To explore the probability distribution Monte Carlo sampling is usually required
- Closed-form solutions are possible for special cases

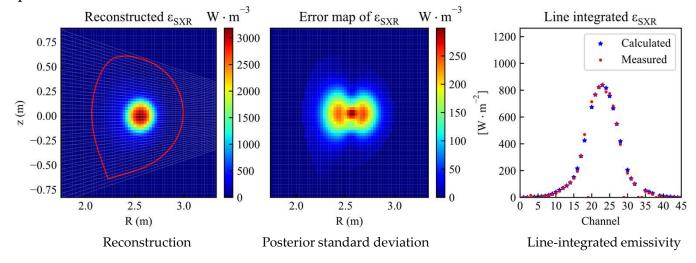




# Bayesian tomography with Gaussian process priors

- Tomography: ill-posed problem, number of unknowns (pixels) >> number of observations
- Gaussian processes: non-parametric model, capable of fitting almost all smooth functions
- > Bayesian tomography with Gaussian process priors  $\rightarrow$  analytically tractable posterior distributions
- > Magnetic equilibrium information can also be incorporated in the prior

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# Integrated estimation of tungsten concentration profiles

- Integrated data analysis (IDA): coherent solution that is consistent with all diagnostics; no explicit error propagation needed
- Plasma emission diagnostics:
  - SXR

$$\varepsilon_{\rm SXR} = n_{\rm e}^2 \left[ L_{\rm H}^{\rm SXR}(T_{\rm e}) + c_{\rm W} \cdot L_{\rm W}^{\rm SXR}(T_{\rm e}) \right]$$

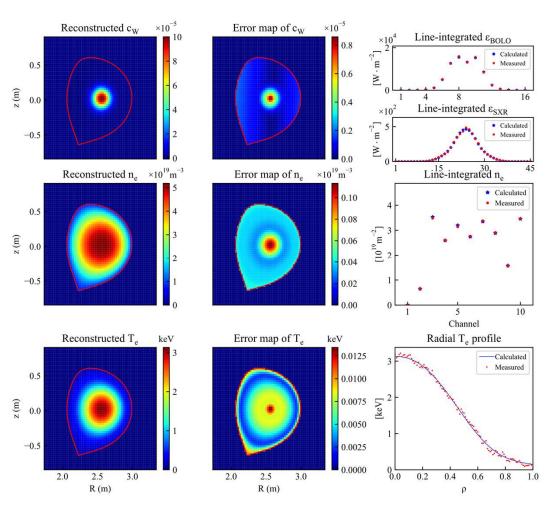
Bolometer

$$\varepsilon_{\rm BOLO} = n_{\rm e}^2 \big[ L_{\rm H}^{\rm BOLO}(T_{\rm e}) + c_{\rm W} \cdot L_{\rm W}^{\rm BOLO}(T_{\rm e}) \big]$$

Joint posterior distribution:

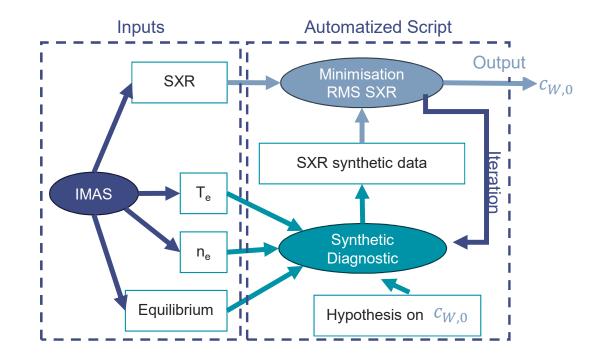

# 3<sup>rd</sup> method: synthetic diagnostic

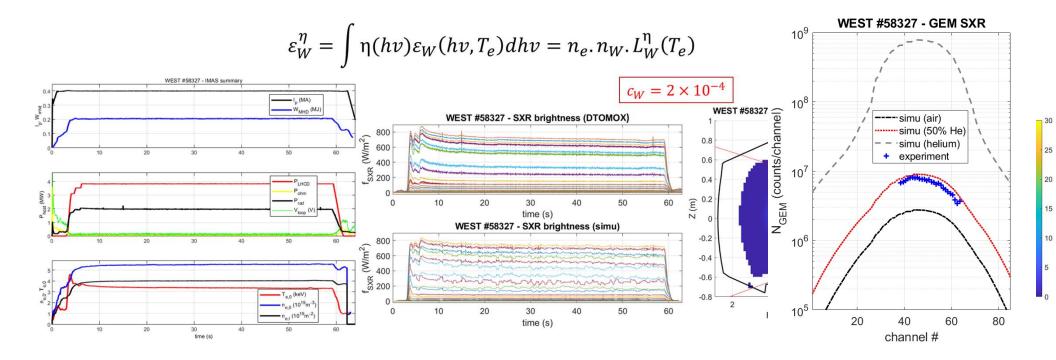
Valid for Te > 2 keV (sufficient signal) but numerically costly.



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# 3<sup>rd</sup> method: synthetic diagnostic



This method makes use of SXR measurement (DTOMOX), Si Diodes detectors absolutely calibrated

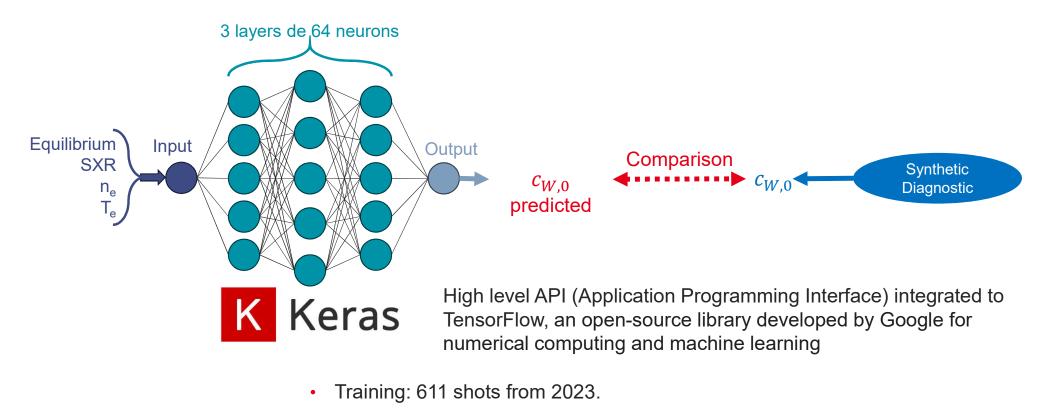
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# **Neural Network** approach: a faster solution





• Validation on 503 shots from 2024.

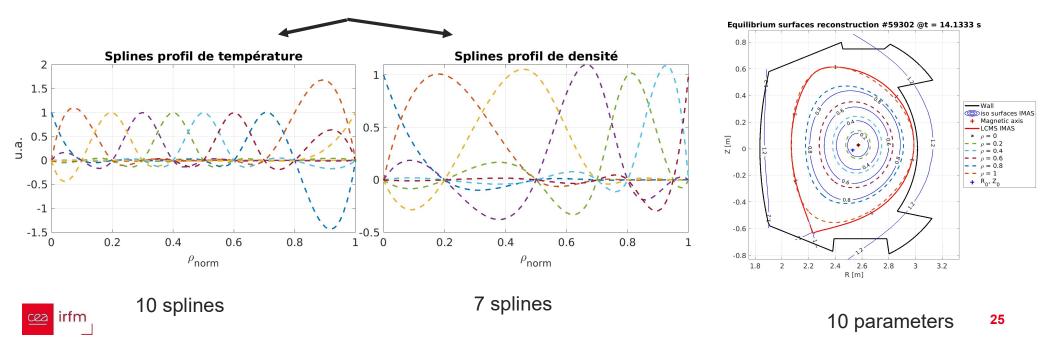


# **Parametrisation: reduction of inputs number**

# **Magnetic surfaces parametrisation**

 $\begin{cases} R = R_{axis} + \Delta(\rho) + \rho \cos(\vartheta + \gamma(\rho) \sin \vartheta) \\ Z = Z_{axis} + \rho K(\rho) \sin \vartheta \end{cases}$ 

 $\rho$  radial coordinate,  $R_{axis}$  et  $Z_{axis}$  magnetic axis coordinates,  $\Delta(\rho)$  Shafranov shift ( $\Delta$ <0),  $\gamma(\rho)$  triangularity and  $K(\rho)$  elongation.

The Shafranov shift, elongation and triangularity functions can be assumed to be monotonic and can be expressed by the relations:

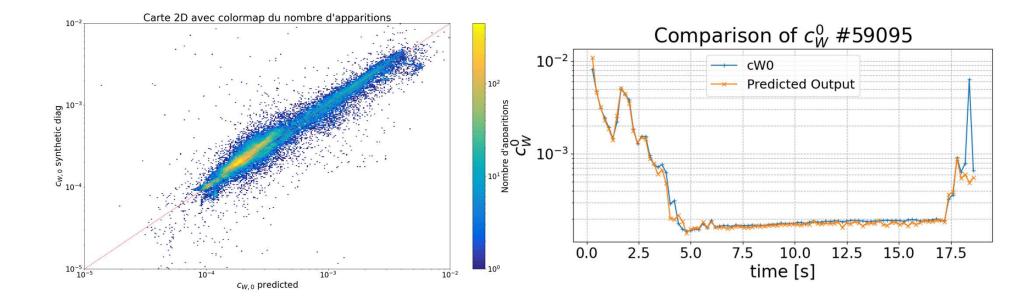
$$\Delta(\rho) = \left(\frac{\rho}{\rho_{LCMS}}\right)^{\alpha} \Delta_{LCMS} \quad \left| K(\rho) = K_{axis} + a_2 \left(\frac{\rho}{\rho_{LCMS}}\right)^2 + a_4 \left(\frac{\rho}{\rho_{LCMS}}\right)^4 \right| \gamma(\rho) = \gamma_{LCMS} \left(\frac{\rho}{\rho_{LCMS}}\right)^{\beta}$$

With  $\Delta_{LCMS} = R_0 - R_{axis}$ ,  $R_0$  geometrical axis of the LastClosed Magnetic Surface and  $K_{axis}$  elongation on axis.

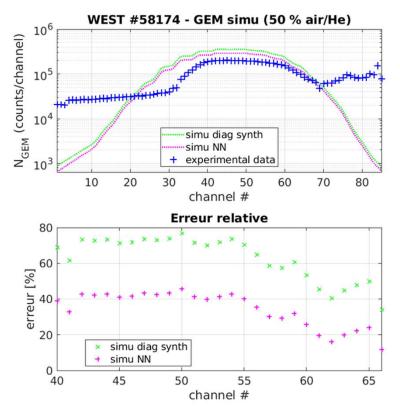
Very good global agreement and also on time evolution.

Good agreement despite uncertainties in Helium content

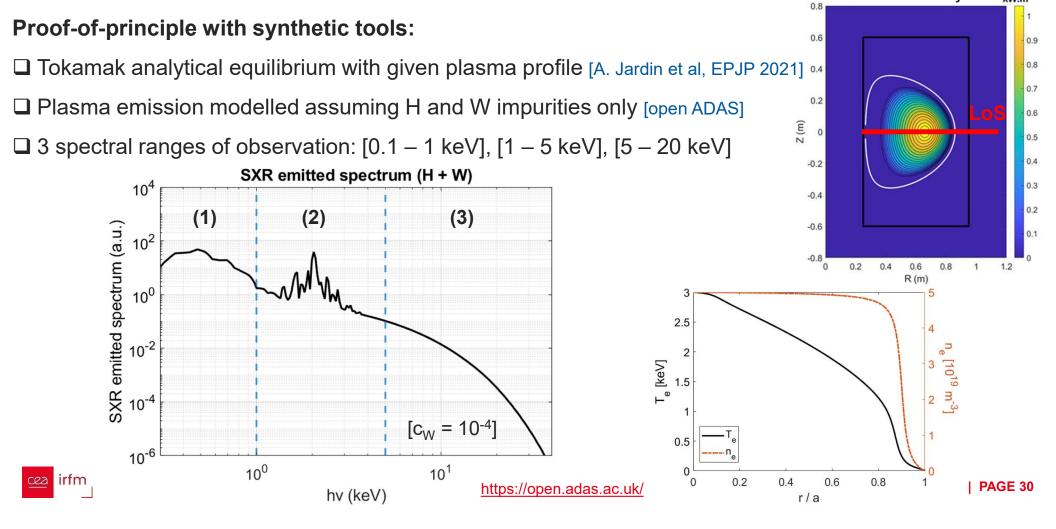

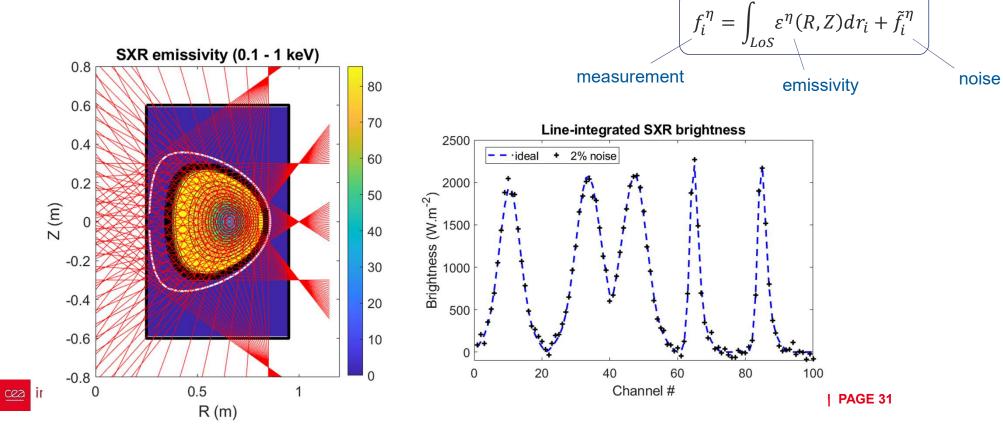

Synthetic tomographic system made of five X-ray cameras, 20 LoS each

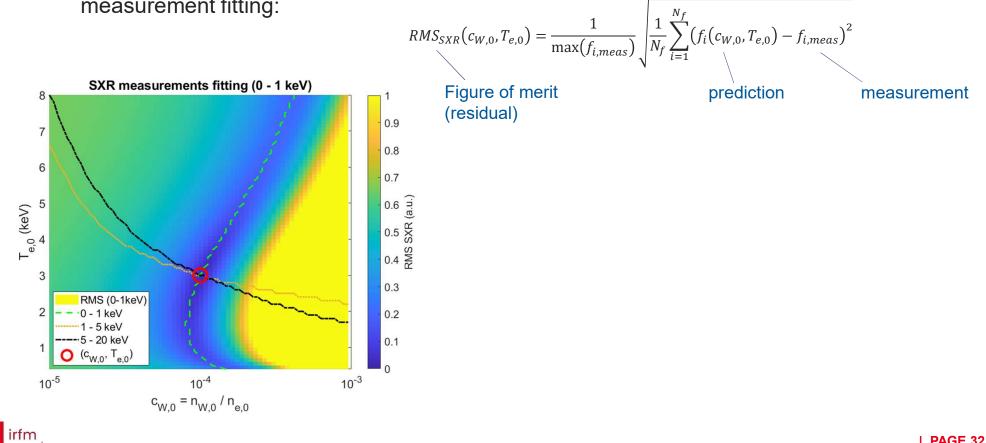
Line-integrated measurements with 2% Gaussian noise

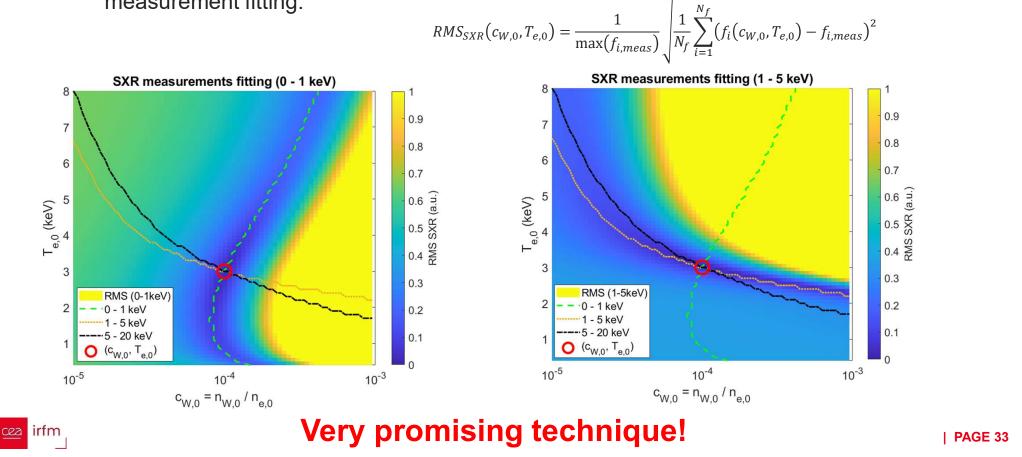

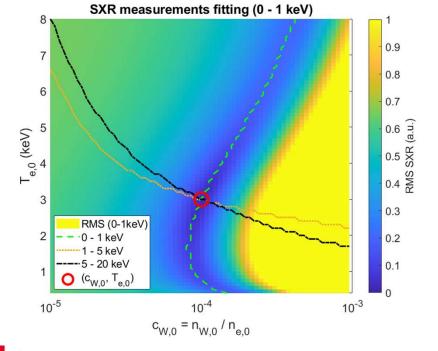

$$RMS_{SXR}(c_{W,0}, T_{e,0}) = \frac{1}{\max(f_{i,meas})} \sqrt{\frac{1}{N_f} \sum_{i=1}^{f} (f_i(c_{W,0}, T_{e,0}) - f_{i,meas})^2}$$



→ Requires Hard X-ray (HXR) modelling

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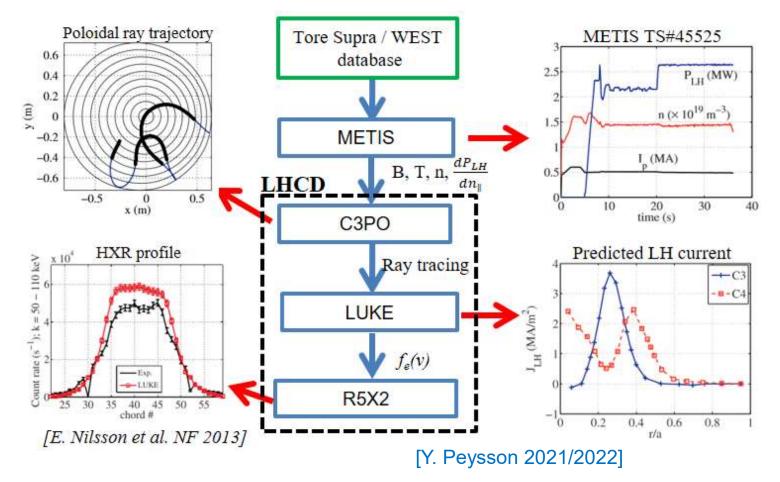
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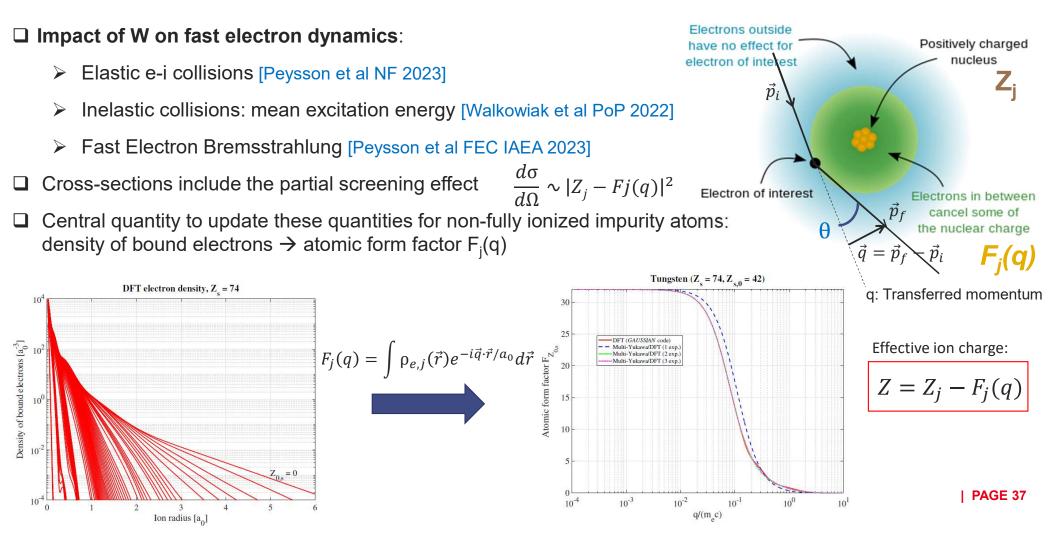

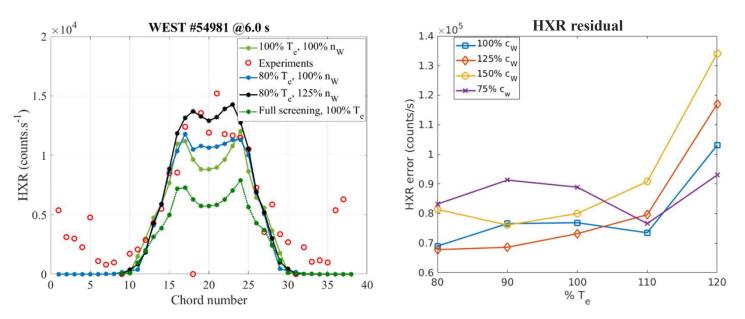

□ HXR and SXR modeling give consistent results:

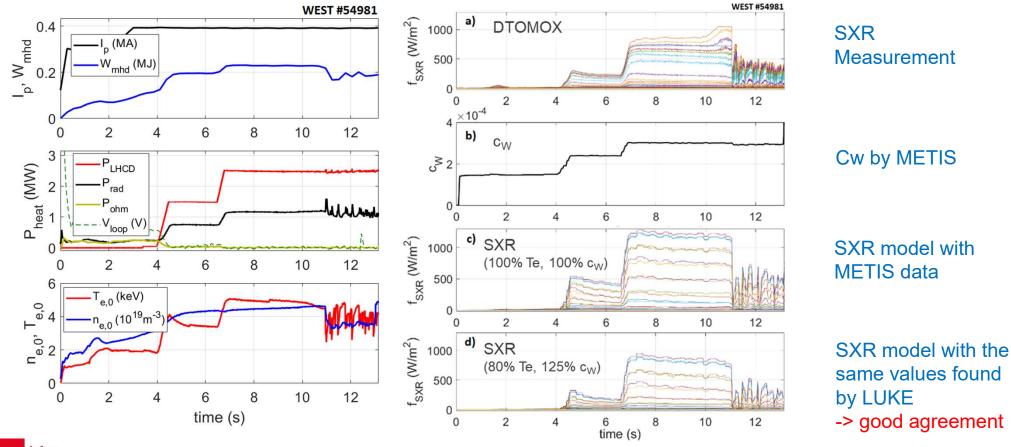
**Figure.** Modelling using METIS LUKE R5X2 suite of codes of HXR measurements in the energy range 60-80 keV for WEST #54981 at 6.0 s. Left: comparison Full screening/partial screening and influence of  $T_e$  and W concentration. Right: Influence of the electron temperature and W concentration on the discrepancy between R5X2 and HXR measurements.

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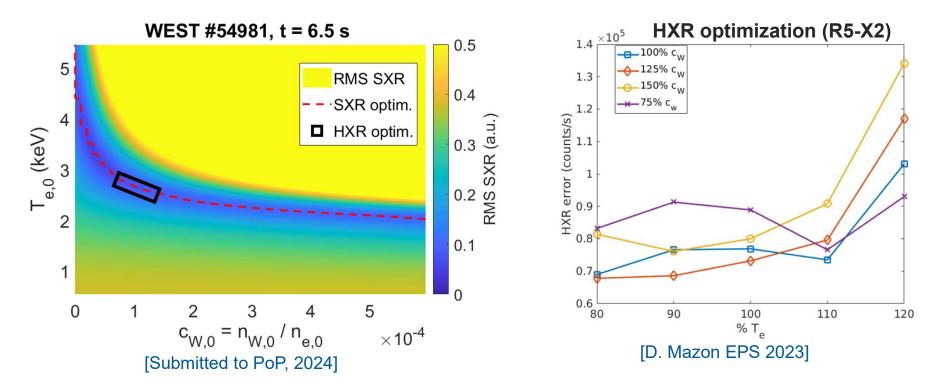
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# (c<sub>w</sub>, T<sub>e</sub>) estimate from SXR + HXR on WEST

□ Experimental test on WEST tokamak with SXR DTOMOX (Si diodes) + HXR (CdTe) diagnostics:

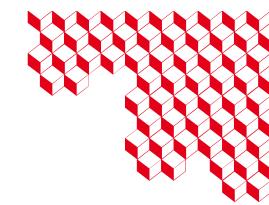


<u>Perspective</u>: extend with tomography in energy bands to recover radial profile  $\rightarrow$  GEM applications  $\stackrel{(22)}{}_{irfm}$   $\stackrel{(12)}{}_{}$ 



## **Conclusions and perspectives**

- Soft-X Ray emission can provide a lot of plasma information including Tungsten distribution
- This requires very good calibration, different set of diagnostics, modelling
- Several techniques to reconstruct the W distribution give coherent results
- Gas detectors seem very promising for ITER and future reactors, resilient to neutrons
- Other techniques (Bayesian, Artificial Intelligence...) are also potential interesting candidates.
